


VETERAN PRISON OFFICIAL DIES

Death claimed another of the state's official family this week in the person of James W. Lewis, warden of the state prison.

"Square Deal" Jim, as Lewis was best known to the prisoners who have come under his wardenship was generally recognized as one of the outstanding prison heads of the nation. Entering the service of the prison in 1919 as deputy warden Lewis had been constantly associated with that institution ever since except for a lapse of four years from 1923 to 1927 when a change in administration resulted in his dismissal. He was returned to the institution in 1927 as warden, serving in that capacity ever since. His administration has been remarkably free of escapes and riots, a


