If you like fictionalized history, I am sure you will like Honors Willy Morrow's "With Malice Toward None."

Mrs. Morrow presents such a life-like Lincoln that it seems he comes to life and you live with him, his joys and his sorrows, you can sympathize with his problems and laugh at his humor. She shows us the true Abraham Lincoln as few who have written of him have succeeded in doing.

The story concerns Lincoln's stay in the White House during the Civil War and the campaign that preceded his second election. Lincoln's family life, his struggle to retain the love of his friends and yet as he saw and knew was the right thing to do are brought forward. Mary Lincoln is presented as a lovable yet brisk and competent "first lady." Tad is the ever bright and mischievous lad that he really was. Bob Lincoln is shown as a young and courageous soldier. An authentic picture is given of many of the important political figures of the time.

Last Year's Tie Game Not Yet Settled Emmett Defeats Nyssa

The Nyssa Bulldogs will go out after their first conference victory tomorrow afternoon when they meet the Parma Panthers in Parma. Last year the two teams battled to a 6-6 tie. The two elevens appear similarly matched this year.

The conference-leading Emmett Huskies trounced the Bulldogs 20-0 on the local gridiron a week ago today. The first score came early in the first quarter when Emmett took the ball from the Nyssa eleven and marched 60 yards for a touchdown. The Huskies kicked for the point.

Emmett again scored in the second quarter after a successful passing attack and a series of power plays. The half ended with the Bulldogs on the Huskies' 20 yard line after a long run by Stanley Ray. The score stood Emmett 13, Nyssa 0.

Nyssa kicked off to Emmett at the start of the second half. The teams exchanged kicks throughout the third quarter with neither team getting in scoring territory.

Early in the last quarter the Huskies pierced the defense of the locals for their third touchdown and converted by a pass. The remainder of the game saw a series of power plays put into action by both teams with neither getting far into the enemy territory. The final score was Emmett 20, Nyssa 0.
