DEMOCRATIC CANDIDATE FOR GOVERNOR

It is high time that the vicious whispering campaign against Henry Hess is understood and put in its right place by the voters of Oregon who must soon select their Governor. No better refutation of these insidious charges can be made than from an editorial in a newspaper which, though not supporting Henry Hess, yet wishes to see a clean campaign.

The editorial is from the Marshfield Times of August 2, 1938, edited by Sheldon F. Sackett, who is a close business associate of Mr. Sprague.

"One of the numerous untruths put in the Oregon campaign nomination for governor was that Henry Hess of La Grande had entered into a deal to pardon all 'goons and gangsters' were he elected governor. Not a scintilla of evidence in support of the assertion was offered, and we happen to know who started the rumor . . .

"The Times is committed to the candidacy of the republican nominee for the governorship. . . It will not be a party, however, to the hitting low at the democratic nominee. As far as our inquiry has gone, Mr. Hess is shown to be an honest, capable La Grande attorney, sympathetic with labor's right to organize and in favor of 'social legislation.' There is nothing in the record of Mr. Hess to sustain charges that he is against law and order or that he is a 'dangerous radical.'

"Therefore, as the campaign warms up, we think that it is wise for republican forces to cease making charges against this opponent which cannot be sustained."
