1500 Tons of Hay Sells For \$8— OWYHEE—S. T. Calhoun reported this week that he had sold 1500 tons of hay to a W. P. Bales, agent for dairymen for \$8 per ton in the stack. This is the largest single sale that has been reported in this section, so far this year.

Calhoun also reported that he had made another sale of 500 tons to William McEwen on a conditional market price

Hauling Beets With Team— The unusual sight for these days of seeing two teams of draft horses hitched to a truck hauling sugar beets to the sugar factory in Nyssa is being furnished daily by Jim Boor, who owns a farm 1 1/2 miles north of town. Boor began hauling the beets from his farm in a four-wheel rubber tired truck last week, hauling about four tons of beets to the load. He is making four or five round trips daily.

Shipments Reaching Peak— Forty-four carloads of farm produce from lands in the Nyssa territory, 38 cars of lettuce, 2 of potatoes and 4 of onions, have rolled out of the Union Pacific yards to eastern and western markets since the night of Tuesday, October 18, records at the local freight office showed Tuesday. Prior to October 18 there had been shipped during the month 24 cars of produce.

The F. H. Hogue Produce company is handling the shipment of lettuce, potatoes and some onions at the packing house while Burns & Ray and Pacific Fruit & Produce, Inc., Nampa, commission firms, have leased the Owyhee Farms warehouse on the Union Pacific right-of-way, just back of the Boise Payette Lumber company yards and are buying and shipping yellow onions. At that warehouse two to three-inch yellow onions have been brought in the past few days at prices ranging from 70 to 75 cents a hundred loaded on cars, netting the growers from 40 to 45 cents a hundred, after 30 cents has been deducted for labor, sack, twine and inspection by the state department. Three-inch or larger yellow onions are commanding 90 cents a hundred loaded on the cars, netting the grows 60 cents.

Prices continue to fluctuate daily at the markets, the lower prices paid apparently being brought about by the large shipments at present of lettuce and potatoes. Where two weeks ago lettuce was selling from 90 cents to \$1 a crate, now the top price is 75 cents a crate. The same thing is true of potatoes. Netted Gems selling for 50 cents a sack and Bliss Triumphs for 65 cents.
