The hay was fairly dry after turning it and rolling it around a bit. The clover was rather dampish but guess it will have to wait till spring anyway.

Now we only have remainder of three small hay crops; Mort Wickson's hay has been in the shock and most of it stacked for several weeks. Elza Niccum's millet has been cut some time but he has about given up hopes of stacking it.

Last year he cut his hay late and had to feed it out of the field for by the first of February it had never yet been dry enough to stack. But we new farmers to this country thought there wouldn't be so much rain this year.

Clarence Niccum has 8 acres of fourth cutting hay that has been cut about two weeks and is still too green to rake. He stands a good chance to have to pasture it off yet. Next time he will pasture it in the first place.

Jim Trummel still has 14 acres of clover seed in the shock which he thinks looks pretty good but it too would look better if it were in the stack.

Liet. Cloninger got another half day threshing of clover seed out of the field Tuesday it was "just a leetle," damp but he expects to run the chaff pile through again anyway.

Chuck Share got the last of his spuds in the cellar Tuesday so he is wearing a big smile too. Chuck has been having quite a time with his spuds. He has been digging off

and on with different neighbors help for a couple of weeks but how they are in the cellar and the digger has moved over to Jim Trummel's place.

Jim started himself a spud cellar a while ago but a beet topping job came along and he forgot the cellar. Now pretty cold nights are coming. The topping job is finished and Jimmie is busy finishing the cellar and also digging spuds.

One new land farmer tells us that he made more money topping beets than he did raising them. Russell Howell hauled the last of his water melon crop in for hog feed. He says melons make good hog feed even if frozen.

There was a rancher from over in on the Malheur river country up through the Hollow Tuesday rounding up some of his range horses.

Loose stock presents quite a problem to many new land farmers who haven't much fence.
