THEY CHEERED WHEN THE BOYS WENT "OVER THERE"

It is a strange thing to hear Americans object to the recently inaugurated armament plan of our administration.

Misguided peace organizations and individuals seem to be imbued with the idea that to bring the armaments of the United States up to a point that will insure our continental limits against aggression from ANY source, is heading us into war. These same people accuse those in our armed forces of being "saber rattlers."

These are the persons that were on the sidelines cheering the boys on their way "over there" in 1917—and stepped into the jobs that were promised the "soldier boys" when they returned from giving the "Hun" a bit of his own medicine! We wonder how many of these misguided pacifists have ever stopped a piece of shrapnel, or had a good whiff of mustard gas, or tried to cross "no-mans land" during a "scissor fire" of a nest of machine-guns? The military man knows what the soldier goes through in a war. It isn't he who asks to go to war, rather he implores his country to be so armed and so prepared that there will be no possibility of the necessity of going to war!

As ample testimonials to the matter of being properly armed from a national standpoint, we have only to look at the fate of a few of the ancient nations whose identity are fast being lost, through the lack of a proper national spirit backed up with proper armaments—Ethiopia, China, Czechoslovakia, or Austria.

In the United States we have always refrained from territorial acquisition through force of arms. As in the past so in the future, we are not desirous nor envious of any other nations lands—as witness the lack of fortifications between the boundaries of Canada and Mexico!

Totalitarian governments are working overtime trying to get our neighbors in South America to swing to their form of government—when, and if that is accomplished, is it not natural to suppose that on some pretext or another an "incident" will be trumped up or as happened in Czechoslovakia, a "minority problem" will present itself? In that event are we to believe that we, as a nation, would be spared any of the fate of those that foolishly relied on the present or future "civilization" of the world powers?

There is more to this armament program than the protection of our national life—there is the present need for the taking up of a portion of our unemployment. Even in this conclusion there are those that decry the use of labor in the building of these armaments, of the increasing of our armed forces. Yet it does devolve itself down to a partial solution of getting some of our younger generation out of the ranks of the unemployed and better still off the relief rolls.

As a matter of fact, it would not do any of our high school graduates harm to serve for a period of three years in our armed forces, with a schedule worked out on the basis of the first year being spent in learning how to be a soldier, and then two years of either vocational training or pre-college courses. Our theory being that the average high school graduate is not, in most instances, positive in his own mind just what vocation or profession he desires to follow throughout his lifetime.

\$41,750.00 OF SCHOOL BUILDING BONDS OF AND BY UNION HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 5, MALHEUR COUNTY, OREGON, AND INVITING BIDS THEREFOR.

NOTICE HEREBY IS GIVEN, That sealed bids will be received by the District School Board of Union High School District No. 5, Malheur County, Oregon, at the office of Carl H. Coad, Clerk of said District, at Nyssa, Oregon, until the hour of 2:00 o'clock P. M. on the 10th day of December, 1938, for the purchase of an issue of bonds of said Union High School District No. 5 in the amount of \$41,750.00.

Said bonds will be negotiable coupon bonds; will be registered to principal only at the option of the holder; will each be designated "School Building Bond"; will be dated of January 1, 1939, and will be in denominations of \$1000.00 each, excepting Bond No. 42 which will be for \$750.00; will be numbered consecutively from 1 to 42, both numbers inclusive; will mature serially in numerical order in the amount of \$2000.00 on the 1st day of January, 1962; will bear interest at a rate not to exceed six per cent (6%) per annum, payable semi-annually on the 1st day of July and the 1st day of January, of each year until maturity; will be payable both as to principal and interest in lawful money of the United States of America at the office of the County Treasurer of Malheur County, at Vale, Oregon; and will be callable on and after January 1, 1947.

Said bonds are issued by virtue of a majority vote of the legal voters of said Union High School District No. 5, Malheur County, Oregon, voting at an election duly called and held on October 8, 1938, and by virtue of a resolution of the District School Board of said Union High School District duly passed and adopted on the 19th day of November, 1938, and pursuant to the Constitution and Laws of the State of Oregon, including Chapter XX, Title 35, Oregon Code, 1930, and laws amendatory thereof and supplemental thereto, and Sec. 56-2308, Oregon Code 1935 Supplement, as amended.

Each bid, except when made by a state or government agency, must be accompanied by a certified check in the amount of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) payable to the order of Union High School District No. 5, Malheur County, Oregon. Checks of unsuccessful bidders will be returned upon the awarding of the bonds, and the check of the successful bidder will be retained to be applied toward payment for the bonds or for the security of Union High School District No. 5, Malheur County, Oregon, in case of default by bidder.

All bids must be in writing, must be unconditional, and must be for not less than par and accrued interest. Bids will be opened publicly, immediately after the final hour hereinabove set forth for submitting bids, at the office of the undersigned Clerk at Nyssa, Oregon.
