NOTICE TO WATER USERS

The following section of Ordinance No. 246, passed by the Common Council May 16, 1938, will be enforced on and after December 1, 1938.

Section 9. All such tolls and charges shall be due and payable in advance and unless paid within ten days same shall become delinquent. It shall be the duty of the Water Superintendent to notify each water user who is delinquent, and give such water user an opportunity to pay such delinquency, but if the amount of the delinquency be not paid within five days of the time of delinquency the superintendent shall forthwith shut off the water from such consumer and shall keep the same shut off until all such charges against such consumer are paid, together with the fee of One Dollar for turning on said water.
