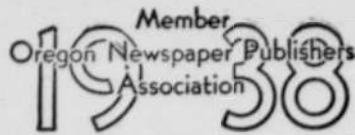

Nyssa, Oregon Dec. 3, 1938

Editor Gate City Journal:
I saw in the Dec. 1 issue of the Argus that G. M. Kerr of the Salt Lake office of the federal grazing district has handed down a decision in which he interprets owners of dry grazing land as class A operators. I was very much surprised as this is the first sensible interpretation of any federal regulated enterprise I have seen for some time and the only sensible ruling ever handed down under the Taylor grazing act. I also noted with some concern that the local advisory board did not approve of this ruling, therefore I am writing this letter hoping to have it printed to give the public the little stockman's side of the situation and to try to correct some of the misguided ideas in regard to the Taylor grazing act as I see them.

My father came to this country when there was nothing here and developed several ranches and helped build the old Owyhee ditch. He was almost always connected with stock raising and stockmen. My brother and myself were trying to follow in his chosen field and were trained as stockmen. We saw the disappearance of open range by the 640 acre homestead law. We saw the county become owners of large tracts of this land and the state of Oregon become owners of other large bodies of land through the World War veterans state aid society. We began purchasing this land as others did, and at the present own 8000 acres of good high range. We

Have some responsibility in both districts.
Again I say thank you Mr. Kerr for the first practical ruling from governmental regimentation.

NOTICE HEREBY IS GIVEN, That sealed bids will be received by the District School Board of Union High School District No. 5, Malheur County, Oregon, at the office of Carl H. Coad, Clerk of said District, at Nyssa, Oregon, until the hour of 2:00 o'clock P. M. on the 10th day of December, 1938, for the purchase of an issue of bonds of said Union High School District No. 5 in the amount of \$41,750.00.

Said bonds will be negotiable coupon bonds; will be registerable as to principal only at the option of the holder; will each be designated "School Building Bond"; will be dated as of January 1, 1939, and will be in denominations of \$100.00 each, excepting Bond No. 42 which will be for \$750.00; will be numbered consecutively from 1 to 42, both numbers inclusive; will mature in the amount of \$2000.00 on the 1st day of January in each of the years 1942 to 1961, both inclusive, and in the amount of \$1750.00 on the 1st day of January, 1962; will bear interest at a rate not to exceed six per cent (6%) per annum, payable semi-annually on the 1st day of July and the 1st day of January, of each year until maturity; will be payable both as to principal and interest in lawful money of the United States of America at the office of the County Treasurer of Malheur County at Vale, Oregon; and will be callable on and after January 1, 1947.

Said bonds are issued by virtue of a majority vote of the legal voters of said Union High School District No. 5, Malheur County, Oregon, voting at an election duly called and held on October 8, 1938, and by virtue of a resolution of the District School Board of said Union High School District duly passed and adopted on the 19th day of November, 1938, and pursuant to the Constitution and Laws of the State of Oregon, including Chapter XX, Title 35, Oregon Code 1930, and laws amendatory thereof and supplemental thereto, and Sec. 56-2308, Oregon Code 1935 Supplement, as amended.

Each bid, except when made by a state or government agency, must be accompanied by a certified check in the amount of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) payable to the order of Union High School District No. 5, Malheur County, Oregon.
