When the harvest is ended and the last beet sliced the company will have accepted 245 thousand tons of superb beets, the heaviest yield being in the Wilder district where an average of 21 tons to the acre was grown. The average yield per acre over the entire area will be approximately 16 tons.

Due to the efficiency of the field crew the beets when received have been in almost perfect condition. Its no fault of theirs if the draatted things freeze. As we said, we need a car inventor.

From reliable sources we learned that the harvest is 99.999 finished which means that the factory will run approximately 50 days longer.
