DIARY OF MY TRIP TO CORVALLIS

June 5—We left Ontario Sunday morning about 9:45. At Weiser our group was increased by six more 4-H boys and girls from Annex. After we left Baker it wasn't long until we were in the timber. We changed trains at Portland and went as far as Albany. From Albany to Corvallis we rode on a bus. We arrived in Corvallis between 1 and 2 o'clock in the morning. The girls all slept at Waldo Hall and the boys slept in the men's dormitory.
June 6—We got up at 6:45 and had breakfast at 7:15. We ate at the Memorial Union building built for the alumni. Immediately after breakfast we came back to Waldo Hall and received our assigned rooms. At 10 o'clock the girls who had been assigned to other houses left on a school bus. The rest of the day was spent in doing what we pleased.

We next went to a class called "care of clothing" and we each made a patch. We only had two classes that day. At noon I went back to Waldo Hall and ate dinner. Rest period came next, then assembly. We had several speakers and a girl played a violin solo. After assembly we had recreation and several of us went swimming. After recreation we had supper and at 7:30 we assembled in the parlor and elected our council member and president. Right after that we all went to bed.
