STATED BONDED DEBT REDUCED
SALEM — Oregon's bonded debt was reduced another \$750,000 this week with the retirement of another block of highway bonds.

PHONE COMPANIES TAX SHOWN
Of every dollar collected by telephone companies operating in Oregon during 1937 13.72 cents was paid out for taxes, according to a report compiled by N. G. Wallace, public utilities commissioner.

STATE LIQUOR PROFITS
A total of \$2,481,261.10 in liquor profits was made available for relief purposes during 1938, according to a report by the liquor control commission.

LINCOLN COUNTY ON HONOR ROLL
Lincoln county is the only county in the state which has no public school debt either bond or warrant, according to a report by Superintendent A. M. Cannon to the state department of education.
