### DOES THE "CLASS" OR MAJORITY RULE?

WE are wondering if the efforts, of certain self-styled "labor leaders" in Oregon, in attempting to have the recently enacted anti-picketing law set aside, does not prove that these men are willing to let the majority rule, only so long as it does not affect them.

The anti-picketing bill was put up to the people of this state to vote on, they did and voted for the bill. Malheur county farmers voted strongly for the bill, as did those urban dwellers. What happened in Malheur county happened all over the state. It was clearly a mandate to these "labor-leaders" to settle their factional disputes and get down to the business of getting Oregon back on its feet, agriculturally and industrially. We are sure that none of the voters would take away from the laboring man the right to strike against intolerable laboring conditions.

It is only natural that these "leaders" would use every artifice in the political setup, including the hearing before the Social Security board in Washington. We can see no reason why social security should be taken away from Oregon over the anti-picketing bill. It abridges no rights of the worker, rather does it protect him from the admitted labor racketeer, that draws his power from the internal dissension of labor.

It is actions such as this that prompts the question "Does the Class or Majority Rule?"

He not only makes others happy for having met him, but he, himself, really benefits from meeting people. It works both ways, and makes life easier and happier for everyone.

There is a lot of woe in the world, and anyone can very easily give in to the worries and hardships of life. By giving in to them, we can make ourselves and everyone we meet feel miserable. But, if each of us would try, really try, for a few days, to see all the beauty and happiness which life offers, we would not only make ourselves feel more gay; we would also cause others to be happier. Surely, so great a reward as this should be well worth the effort.
