CONGRATULATIONS MR. PIERCE

CONGRESSMAN Walter M. Pierce has introduced a bill in the House of Representatives that, to say the least, is one step in the direction of weed control.

A copy of the bill was sent to the Nyssa Gate City Journal and the letter accompanying it tells the story in a nutshell—except that it is up to every interested farmer, and everyone should be interested in weed control, to write their approval to Mr. Pierce and all of the other members of the Oregon Congressional party. Now it will not do a bit of good for us to remind you of your duty in this column unless you do something about it! We have Granges, and Farm Associations throughout the county, these as well as the individual should carry out the above suggestion.

Without further comment here is the Congressman's letter:

"My bill on weed control which is enclosed herewith is one of the most important to be considered by the 76th Congress. Noxious weeds are a menace. They are increasing at a rapid rate and rendering many fertile acres non-productive. Ask your farmers about weeds in your locality—morning glory, white top and Russian Knap weed. If the steady march against the noxious weeds is to go on, the farmer must have cheap Sodium Chlorate, the most successful weed killer.

"Sodium Chlorate, made from common salt by an electrical process is the most effective remedy for weed eradication. It is sold in Europe at four cents a pound. In America Sodium Chlorate costs from 8 to 12 cents a pound. The American farmer uses about twenty million pounds annually. On manufacturing firm, at Niagara, makes about two-thirds of this. The other one-third is imported, chiefly from Germany, also by one firm. For the benefit of this one manufacturing firm, a specific duty of 1½ cents per pound is levied on all importations. In the last ten years American farmers have paid a tax, through the tariff, of over \$3,000,000, for the benefit of this firm.

"The enactment of my bill, H. R. 196, will cut the price of Sodium Chlorate to the American farmer at least one-half. Cheap Bonneville power solves the problem for us. Why should we give it to a profit-seeking firm? What better can the river do for the farmer? I propose a government plant at Bonneville, chlorate to pay back the actual cost and to be sold to farmers without profit."

CHRISTMAS BEFORE CHRIST

Dear Editor:

Probably 90 per cent of those who celebrated Christmas recently believed they were celebrating the actual anniversary of the birth of Christ and that Christmas is an institution peculiar to the Christian religion. If so, they were wrong on both counts. Christ was not born on the 25th of December and Christmas was observed in all its essential features centuries before Christ was born. It had all the features seen in the present day observance of the occasion, including the birth of a savior. God who was born of a Virgin. There was generally a week of celebration, which ended on the 24th and the savior God was born on the 25th.

Practically every so called pagan religion had its savior God, who differed very little from Christ. An almost exact parallel to him was Apollonius of Tyana, who was almost a contemporary. Pagan writers termed Christmas with borrowing from the life of Apollonius and claimed that he was superior to Jesus in his teachings and miracles.

His birth was announced in advance by a messenger (angel) who told the mother to go to a meadow to be delivered. A meteorite appeared in the sky as a portent of his birth. Neither was Christ born in Bethlehem, as is universally taught by the churches, if we can credit the evidence of eminent scholars. Ernest Renan a noted French scholar of the 19th century says in his book "The Life of Jesus: "Jesus was born at Nazareth, a small town of Galilee. All his life he was designated "The Nazarene," and it is only by an embarrassing and roundabout way that in the legends respecting him he is made to be born at Bethlehem."

Regarding the date of his birth Renan says: "The precise date of his birth is unknown. It took place under the reign of Augustus, about the Roman year 750 probably some years before the year one of the Christian era. The Gospel writers must have got their dates mixed for the historian Josephus tells us that the tax referred to, took place in 6 A. D., approximately 10 years after Christ's birth.
