THERE IS NO PAUPER'S OATH

NO pauper's oath is required of any beneficiary under the old-age assistance act. The fiction persists that there is such a thing and many people have been brought to believe it.

The provision whose repeal is sought under a bill presented by Senators Balentine and Ellis at Salem is one which requires of property-owning applicants for old-age assistance that they give a trust deed or bonds to the state for their property, to insure that after they die the state shall be reimbursed for whatever it has paid them in monthly amounts. Nothing whatever is taken from them while they live.

Governor Sprague recommended in his message that this provision be repealed, but that whatever amounts are paid by the state to beneficiaries of the old-age assistance act shall still remain a first lien against any real property they may leave. If the present provision is repealed, the modified lien plan certainly should be retained. It is hard to see why there should be objection to it.

The Oregon old-age assistance act is not a pension measure. Its self-declared purpose is to give help to aged persons who are in need. On that basis it is justified and so is the proposal to increase the amount of benefits under the act to the needy, if that can be financed. Nor should the fact that an applicant owns a modest home or other non-income-giving property be a bar to eligibility. But surely in such cases the beneficiaries ought to be willing that the state be reimbursed after they die from the proceeds of the property which can no longer benefit themselves.—The Oregonian.

THE PICKETING LAW

NOT a few editors throughout the state have within the past few weeks jubilantly jumped all over the recently voted "anti-picketing" law. Some of them claimed that it would have to be thrown out of the statutes entirely in order for Oregon to benefit under the federal social security law. They hailed it as just retribution to the employers of the state, claiming that these employers would now face the probability of having to pay twice as much to this fund as they are now paying.

Now it develops that it is merely a matter of definition as to employees drawing compensation while out on strike. This our state legislators are now working on, with the help of some members of the social security board from Washington. In this work, harmony has been the keynote, with the result that a definition of the "disputes" clause is apparently being worked out to the satisfaction of everyone except "labor leaders" who, we still maintain, believe in majority rule providing that rule coincides with their views. The people of this state voted for the law why now should any group seek to have that law set aside? The original idea of these labor leaders was to have the entire law voided, failing in this they are now "dissatisfied with the proposed amendment, but, they frankly admit, do not know what effect the amendment will have." It seems to us to be a case of being "agin" the law on general principles, rather than any real cause.

The state senate committee has wisely decided on holding hearings before the amendment will be voted on. In doing this, full airing of the actual facts will be had.

Dear Editor:

I have been very much impressed by what I have been reading in your paper written by the "Happy Farmer," who lives in Cow Hollow. It is so breezy and cheery, something different.

I myself, am somewhat interested in the development of the "Great West," particularly in the Owyhee project, being an old timer in Malheur county. I arrived in 1884 from Kansas, having made the trip in a covered wagon.

Since then I have watched the steady development of the county from a barren waste with but one house, as I remember, between the Owyhee settlement and Ontario.

And what is now the flourishing little city of Nyssa consisted of nothing more than a section house and water tank.

It was in 1888 that work began on the Owyhee ditch by a few settlers. One of them, my father, a veteran of the Civil War.

Then in 1907 Mr. Kingman together with a few others coming from Illinois and Ohio established a little settlement on the south side of the Owyhee river which in honor of Mr. Kingman was named Kingman Colony. And through his untiring efforts and influence the great Owyhee project was at this time taken under advisement at

Washington, D. C., and about 30 years later became a finished reality.

And now at this time, January, 1939, this once barren desert is dotted all over every where with little farm homes and cultivated fields.

Now can you blame me for liking that Cow Hollow news by the "Happy Farmer."
