SMALL BLAZE IN EDER GROCERY

INCENDIARISM BLAMED FOR THURSDAY FIRE

Regarded as incendiary in character was the fire, fortunately extinguished before any damage was done, which threatened for a few moments last Thursday night the business block occupied by the Eder Hardware company.

The fire alarm was turned in at 9:20 o'clock after Mrs. Mona Campe owner of the lunch stand in the Smoke House, had caught the reflection of a burning rag in the Eder grocery warehouse from her window directly across the alley from the warehouse. Bill Barnes, one of the Smoke House patrons, hurried to the scene with a bucket of water, and after breaking more glass in the window threw the water onto the burning rag through the opening. The oil rag was reposing among some lamp black in a straw board carton on top of a barrel of turpentine, both Barnes and Fire Chief William Schireman discovered at the right of the bank of oil barrels. Pulling the carton through the door Schireman stomped the blaze out. The alley was crowded with people by that time, quite a number coming from the Chamber of Commerce meeting.

After breaking a portion of the glass in the warehouse window the firebug touched a match to the rag and tossed it through the opening into the strawboard carton. Had the rag been thrown a few inches further and fallen on the greasy floor in front of the barrel of turpentine, a conflagration of large proportions, perhaps destroying the building occupied by Eder Hardware company would have resulted. Bowman, the veterinarian, advises cat owners in the block to keep their pets closely in their rooms the next few days. He thinks the danger will be over in that time.
