A HORRIBLE RESPONSIBILITY

LAST Friday the State of Oregon exacted the supreme penalty from a young man who had murdered another. With the wisdom of such punishment we have no argument—there are arguments on both sides of the question of capital punishment—to which our bit would not help at arriving at a solution.

But think of the horrible responsibility of our Governor, or for that matter ANY Governor, in having to decide the matter of reprieve or commutation of the death sentence. To our mind it is not fair to place this decision on any one person—just think—a mother pleading, with tears in her eyes, for the life of her child. Naturally she can see only her side of the picture, she will lose sight of the fact that a jury has rendered a verdict, that a judge has pronounced sentence.

And what man would be so heartless as to deny to a parent the small comfort, and in most cases, vain effort, to plead the cause of saving the life of it's child? Certainly not a man who is placed in the high position of Governor of this state.

It would seem to us that the matter of reprieve or commutation of the death sentence should be so arranged that the Governor of a state would have no power to act. This would obviate the excruciating heart-ache that must be the lot of a man who must say no to the mother or father of the condemned. If on this score, it is felt that some last resort should be left open, then we suggest a board of not less than three people, whose duty it would be to review such cases, and not leave on the conscience of one man the thought that perhaps he had decided wrongly.

I have recently been giving some thought to the question of what is the matter with our economic system. It doesn't require a person of giant intellect to see that something is fundamentally wrong. We have a country that competent authorities claim is capable of producing two hundred billion dollars of new wealth every year, whereas we actually produce sixty billion or less. As the president says one-third of our population is ill housed and undernourished at a time when our mills and factories are curtailing their output. Why this anomalous situation, come to the conclusion that old man

able basis. This can be done constitutionally by vote of the people. The only limit then to production would be the needs of the people, because if the present setup isn't large enough it could be enlarged to any size necessary. That of course would mean regimentation of the workers, but we have a good many thousand of them already regimented in our postal system and I have heard no land lamentations from that quarter. We have a number here in Nyssa and they seem to be bearing up bravely under their affliction. There are 10 or 12 million more who would like to be regimented but no man will hire them.

Changed conditions mean changed methods. Thomas Jefferson was about the first of our statesmen to discover this truth. In 1816 he wrote: "As new discoveries are made, new truths disclosed and manners and opinions change with the change of circumstances, new institutions with the times. And as Senator Borah cannyly observes "If the American people have to choose between being regimented by the government and being regimented by private monopoly, they would prefer to be regimented by the government."
