

FEEDING TOUR WELL ATTENDED

FARMERS LUNCH IN NYSSA VISIT FACTORY AND YARDS

The Malheur County Feeding Tour, organized by County Agent R. M. McKennon and his newly appointed assistant H. J. Endicott, was in every respect exceptionally interesting and educational, according to a number of the 150 farmers who took part in it.

Starting out from Ontario at the feed lots of the Producers and Feeders Co-operative yards, the tour visited the lamb feeding operations being carried on at the Fred Trenkel farm, going from there to the Pete Tensen and Charles Marshall ranches.

The group arrived at noon in Nyssa where a lunch was served by the Ladies Auxiliary of the Nyssa American Legion.

Following the lunch, the group then went to the Amalgamated Sugar company feeding yards, where some 2300 head of beef is being fed. Then through the \$2,500,000 factory, where they had an opportunity to see the process of extracting sugar from the beets.
