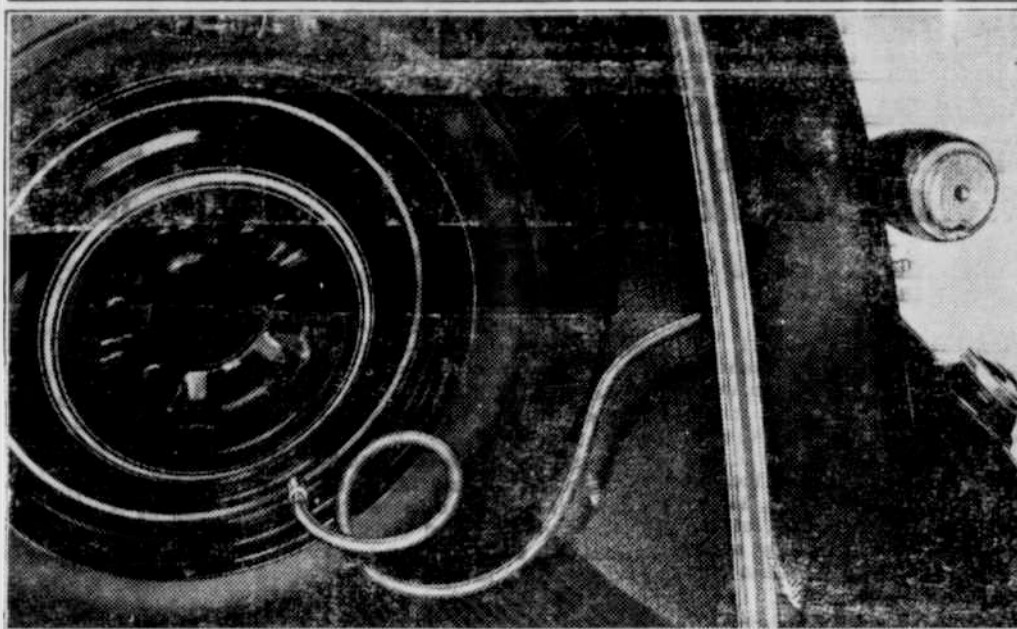
TUESDAY EVENING BRIDGE
