COUNTY F.S.A. CO-OPS HAVE 195 MEMBERS

Corrugators, manure spreaders, grain drills, purebred dairy sires and other operating goods badly needed by newer settlers in Malheur county are available through community and cooperative services of the Farm Security Administration, according to W. N. Young, county supervisor, Odd Fellows' building. Surveys among F.S.A. borrowers indicate lack of sufficient machinery is handicapping operations of many units, and inability to secure services of purebred and proven sires is lowering production of dairy herds.

Heavy equipment and purebred sires are beyond reach of many individual farmers but can be used economically by groups ranging in size from three to 30 farmers according to type of services. Loans running for the life of the service and bearing three per cent interest can be made on a master-borrower or joint ownership basis to participating farmers.

Thirty F.S.A. cooperatives serving 195 farmers are now operating in the county. Facilities include tractors, combine harvesters, manure spreaders, ditchers, grain drills, cultivators, binders and other farm equipment as well as registered dairy sires. Loans are amortized from fees paid by members for the use of the service.

Groups of Malheur county farmers interested in loans for farm equipment or purebred dairy sires can make application at the county F.S.A. office, Odd Fellows' building in Vale, from 9:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon on Mondays, Wednesdays and Saturdays.

STOCK AND GRAIN MARKETS

(Editor's Note: The following market information is supplied from material obtained over the Government leased market wire in the office of the extension economist at Oregon state college. The material is in the form of a weekly summary of trends in the livestock market and is not intended to replace spot day by day market reports.)

Cattle Markets

North Portland on Monday following the arrival of 1400 head. During the entire week previously only 1800 head had been received. The bulk of good fed steers weighing 900 to 1100 pounds brought \$9.25 to \$9.50. The latter was 25c higher than any price obtained last week.

The price increase and strong market condition extended to San Francisco and Chicago so far as the better grades were concerned. At Chicago most of the steers on Monday sold at \$8.75 to \$11.50 but the best demand was for heavy steers which sold up to \$13.25. At San Francisco good to choice fed steers weighing around 1000 pounds brought \$9.85 although some were being held for higher prices.

Sheep and Lamb Market

Lamb markets at North Portland on Monday maintained the increase shown last week with 96-pound fed woolled lambs selling up to \$8.75. Shorn lambs were quoted at \$8.25. Arrivals for the day were about 2500 head which was 500 more than were received all last week.

The improved condition of the sheep and lamb market this year compared to last is a direct result of the increased consumer demand for meats, comparative reports show. A year ago lamb prices declined sharply during December and January, largely because of the market weakness in the demand for meats. Since midsummer last year consumer income and the demand for meats have strengthened considerably, reflecting the improvement in business activity.

Prices of slaughter lambs at the beginning of the fed-lamb marketing season in early December were slightly higher than those of the corresponding period a year earlier. Lamb prices fluctuated to some extent in December and January, but did not change greatly during this period. Prices of good and choice slaughtered lambs at Chicago averaged around \$9, approximately 50c higher than the year earlier. Marketings from the principal western sheep and lamb shipping points showed a slightly decrease over lambs for the week ending February 4. The 251 double deck cars moved were 16 fewer than for the corresponding week last year and 27 cars fewer than for the same week two weeks ago. Estimates as to the number of lambs left in these areas for shipment later this season placed the number considerably

below that of a year ago on the corresponding date, but a little greater than on the same date for two years ago.

Hog Market

Although only 1500 hogs were received at North Portland on Monday trading through the day showed a downward tendency as compared with the increase that occurred on two successive days last week. After a top opening price of \$8.75 the closing top figure was around \$8.50, which compared with a top of \$8.75 last week. The top price at San Francisco was \$8.75 and at Chicago \$8.25.

Wool Market

Finer grades of wool moved in fair volume on the Boston market last week and some purchases of wools held in western range states were reported. In the territory wools most of the business done was in coming fine and half-blood lines. Staple combing length, graded fine territory wools were sold in limited volume at 73c to 75c, scoured basis. Original bag fine territory wools brought 70c scoured basis, for good French combing length and around 68c for short French combing. Prices were steady on fleeces coarser than half-blood.

Wool is unlike most other agricultural commodities produced in this country in that there is no established public market for it. Although from 550 million to 650 million pounds of wool are handled in this country there is no public market where it may be traded in as cotton, wheat, and other farm products are sold. Fractionally all of it is bought and sold privately and a large part is merchandized through a few central markets. The marketing of wool is more concentrated than the marketing of many other important farm products.

POULTRY AND ITS CARE

This article deals with the condition of the adult flock before hatching the young brood. The following suggestions are about as necessary as any measures anyone could take.

Be sure that if there are body lice, immediate steps are taken to eradicate them. Various methods are used. Personally I like the individual application of powder or "pinch" method followed with the method is so popular that I believe that everyone understands it. However if one uses a large wash tub over which to apply the powder less waste of powder is noticed. As to

the dust bath, ashes in a shallow box 6x3x3 with about a cupful of powder to a bushel of ashes.

After each hen is dusted the bath in ashes is usually sufficient to keep down lice.

It is almost imperative that the old flock be as lice-free as possible before young chicks are started.

PREVENTION BEST SURPLUS REMEDY, EVANS BELIEVES

In dealing with the surplus wheat problem, one ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure. R. M. Evans, administrator of the farm act, told a meeting of wheat growers at Pendleton, where he made the final address of a four-stop western tour and his first address in Oregon. The United States is well on its way

towards taking those preventative steps, he said.

Evans called attention to the fact that the present farm act became a law in February, 1938, which was much too late to be effective in adjusting the 1938 acreage of wheat. As a result the acreage last year was nearly an all-time high. This year, however, with the wheat farmer having his first real chance to avail himself of the opportunities which the program offers, winter wheat has been reduced around 10 million acres. If spring wheat producers cooperate to the same degree, he said, prospects are that the total planted acreage for 1939 will not be more than 65 or 66 million acres as compared with an average of more than 80 million acres for the last four years.

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
