GAME COMMISSION CHANGE PROPOSED
Sweeping changes in the state game protection set-up are proposed in a bill sponsored by Senator Wm. L. Dickson and Representatives Carter and Kimberling. The measure would turn all the functions and duties of the present game commission over to a new wildlife conservation commission. In addition this commission would be vested with authority to make rules and regulations for the protection and propagation of all wildlife. These rules and regulations would have the force and effect of law and any existing law that might conflict with the mandates of the commission would be automatically repealed.
