ON DAIRY COWS

(Editor's Note—We are indebted to Mr. R. H. Clark, secretary of the Malheur Jersey Cattle Club for the following article, which in itself is a fine editorial, and feeling that not a few of our farmers are interested in good dairy stock, we are pleased to be able to use it as an editorial.)

It is generally conceded that Malheur county needs more and better dairy cows. This situation regarding better dairy cows, is not peculiar to Malheur county, as the most vital factor in the dairy industry, regardless of location, is good cows. It does not matter how much feed you have, or how much care you take of a cow if she does not have the inherent ability to produce butterfat profitably.

There are two main factors to be considered when starting a dairy herd. The first of course, is money. With unlimited funds it is a simple matter to acquire a fine herd, but most of us are faced with the problem of stretching each dollar as far as possible. The next problem is the difficulty of finding a good cow, or rather of recognizing one when you find her. It has been proven that it is impossible to judge production solely by a good appearance. It is therefore better to buy cows who have records in a testing association. Such cows are scarce and relatively higher in price, so it would seem that the remaining way would be to buy a few cows, the best one can afford, and several calves. Very good calves are obtainable from tested dams and good bulls, and have excellent chances of becoming good cows. These can be obtained at reasonable prices.

The next thing is to decide on the breed. It is desirable to have a uniform herd, unless there are special considerations, such as selling bottled milk. A uniform herd is more pleasing to the eye. The offsprings are more uniform in appearance and production. This uniformity is a decided asset when selling surplus stock.

The choice of breed is governed by several factors. First is the individuals preference; second, the availability of cows and calves, and access to good bulls; third, interlocking with the second, is stock common to and suitable to your locality and market.

In Oregon the most numerous and productive breed is the Jersey. Oregon Jerseys are famous throughout the world. Oregon Jerseys hold 11 of the 18 possible national records for butterfat. One cow, Sybil Terrie Lorna, owned by L. A. Hulburt of Independence, Ore., holds two of these records at present and one of the records is a world record for all breeds. This record is 1020.52 lbs. of butterfat in 305 days, on three milkings per day. In the same location she also produced 17,121 lbs. of milk, also a record. Mr. Hulburt sold her recently for \$520.00.

This is only a short part of the Jersey story for this state has hundreds of other high producing Jerseys, and there are several excellent herds in our own county. This makes the purchasing of outstanding herd sires possible at lower prices. When purchasing calves, as mentioned above, one can obtain good type Jersey calves from dams with production records of 400 lbs. of butterfat or over in a year, for more readily comparable calves of any other breed. In fact, it would be hard to find any quantity of such calves from any other breed in Oregon.

One of the main objections that I hear about Jerseys is their size. When dairying, one should be primarily interested in the fat produced for sale. A Jersey weighing 900 pounds and producing 400 pounds of fat per year is far more profitable than a large beefy animal producing, we'll say 250 pounds. It is, I believe, better to raise good dairy heifers for sale than steers.

There is going to be a demand for good heifers from this valley, as we can turn out a well grown well-bred heifer very cheaply here.

A mongrel steer is not as profitable as a pure-bred beef animal, nor is a mongrel cow as profitable a producer of fat as a well bred cow, so if you are going to dairy, above all, buy dairy cattle. If you want beef, buy beef type, but never, never cross them up, you'll raise some of the heifers sure as shooting.

REMEDY

WE have frequently been accused of destructive criticism. We accept the compliment with pleased gratitude, but we can also be constructive when the occasion demands.

Right now we have in mind the problem of securing lasting peace for our native country. So far, it seems to us that practically everyone has missed the nubbin of the situation. If you are well-read in history, or even if you aren't, just try to remember even ONE war that was ever fought by the men who started it. We defy you to. We'll make it even more forceful and agree to eat our desk eraser if anybody can produce one war during the last two centuries in which those who started the fray served with the troops. And here is where our simple, fool-proof, and effective plan begins.

This would not be a bar to resisting invasion, but it would be a check on such things as American troops serving in Flanders mud and Siberian snow for the honor and glory of Wall Street.

And it would put a terrible crimp in the you-die-for-me patriots with which our country is infested.—The Islander (Honolulu).
