KILL GROUND SQUIRRELS IN SPRING SAYS COUNTY AGENT

Early spring is the best time to reduce numbers of ground squirrels with the use of poisoned grain, believes R. M. McKennon, county agent, who has just obtained 6000 pounds of poisoned grain bait. This supply in 10 and 25 pound bags, is made available at cost to Malheur county farmers.

Squirrels generally consume poisoned grain better before much green vegetation is available and a mature squirrel killed early will prevent the birth of five to eight young. Poisoned grain may be obtained at the county agent's office in Ontario and at the Vale drug store in Vale. A supply will be made available at Jordan Valley and at Ironside shortly.

POULTRY



---And Its Care
By WILEY CLOWERS

While it is impossible in the time and space available to exhaust the supply of information necessary on any one phase of poultry care and other relative data, nevertheless it is more important that seasonal information be given first attention. What is most important to the greater number is hard to decide. Probably the most necessary warning this week has to do with the most common poultry disease, Coccidiosis. There are six different kinds of Coccidia and although commonly as disease of young stock, Coccidiosis sometimes appears to cause serious loss in egg production by developing in mature fowls.

It seems probable that the disease is on the increase in fowls of laying age.

However since this week is wet and warm to a degree makes conditions more favorable for this disease. Since it is present in nearly every flock and is spread through the droppings and aided most by moisture and warmth there may be some trouble in part of the flocks this week.

Control of this disease is to a degree effective and sanitation is the foundation of Coccidiosis control.

Daily removal of litter and droppings is in order especially when chicks begin to suffer and die.

Treatment is of secondary importance and can be recommended only as a means of making the test of an already bad situation.

Coccidiosis occurs in spite of any treatment which has been reported. Control of Ceca or type, involving bleeding of the ceca the following ration may well be fed for a week to 10 days.

Ground yellow corn 80 parts by weight, wheat middlings 20 parts by weight, bone meal 5 part by weight, yimestone grit 1 part by weight, dried milk (skim or butter-milk) 30 parts by weight.

The above together with plenty of drinking water and removal of droppings and litter daily will help. If the weaker fowls are separated from the rest, it will also help.

Added heat is also necessary. The above article only touches upon the disease and its care and control. Those who need added advice see your county agent or I shall give you as much help as I can if you will see me personally. No charge will be made in either case.

STOCK AND GRAIN MARKETS

(Editor's Note: The following market information is supplied from material obtained over the Government leased market wire in the office of the extension economist at Oregon state college. The material is in the form of a weekly summary of trends in the livestock market and is not intended to replace spot day by day market reports.)

Cattle Markets

The substantial increase in receipts of cattle at north Portland for the week ending March 11 was accompanied by a good demand so that prices were maintained on a fairly steady basis. Demand was especially good for all classes of unfinished stock suitable for further feeding.

The better grades of steers at San Francisco showed an upward tendency for the week but lower grades declined. The Chicago market was steady to strong with common to medium grades of steers in best position.

Hog Markets

Offerings of hogs at north Portland for the week of March 6 to 11 totaling 3475 head were 450 more however, were unchanged from the past several weeks.

The San Francisco market softened a little but Chicago made some slight gains. With lighter marketings and a little stronger demand prices at Chicago have been tending upward for the past two months but are still about a \$1.50 lower than a year ago.

Exports of pork and lard from the United States gained substantially in 1938 but are still far below those of 1918 to 1929. Prospects for exporting pork and lard in 1939 were brightened by the trade agreement recently signed by the United States and Great Britain. According to this agreement Great Britain will accept about 61 million pounds of bacon and ham from the United States, whereas in 1918 the total was 48 million.

The removal of the British duty of 10 per cent ad valorem on lard will also tend to stimulate exports of that product from the United States to Great Britain. However, offsetting these concessions is the recent decline in the exchange value of the British pound in terms of American dollars.

Sheep and Lamb Markets

The saleable supply of nearly 3000 head of sheep at north Portland during the week ending March 11 moved under an improved demand at steady to strong prices. Prices at San Francisco and Chicago were also fairly steady. For some time fed lambs at north Portland have been selling at around \$8.50 and at Chicago at \$9.25. The relatively steady situation presents quite a contrast, to the sharp decline that took place in the early spring of 1938. The higher prices of lambs this season than last reflects largely the stronger consumer demand for meats and the smaller slaughter supplies of sheep and lambs.

Wool Markets

Between seasons dulness featured the wool market during the first 10 days of March. While prices on new line of goods and on new clip of wool are being established, it is encouraging to note that no drastic changes appear in store. The market situation is much more favorable than it was a year ago. Domestic stocks have been reduced and consumption prospects are more encouraging.

The most unfavorable factor in the situation now is the threat of increased imports. Wool prices in this country are already relatively high in relation to world prices and further advances in domestic prices carried the danger of greater imports.

SPREADER CO-OPERATIVE FORMED BY F.S.A.

Three Malheur county farmers have organized the Grove Spreader Co-operative near Vale, under the sponsorship of the community and co-operative services section, Farm Security administration, U.S.D.A., according to W. N. Young county rehabilitation supervisor.

Facilities of a manure spreader will be made available for use on member farms and a limited number of other farmers in the community may be enabled to participate. The new co-operative is set up on a joint-ownership plan with members signing partnership agreements on a fee basis.

Earl Parker is treasurer of the service. Other members include Daniel R. Brown and Claude Holsington.

FARMERS CAUTIONED ON BUYING SEED FOR PLANTING

With the spring seeding season at hand farmers are advised by R. M. McKennon, county agent, to be particularly careful that the seed they sow has a minimum of weed seed in it, especially of the so-called noxious kinds.

Under the present Oregon Seed Law all small seeds sold must be labeled showing among other things the total percent of weed seed and the amount of noxious weed seed present. This makes it possible, Mr.

McKennon points out, for farmers to be reasonably sure before they buy as to just what they are getting. This law does not cover grains.

This new law makes possible six free seed tests each year for every farmer. These tests are only for seed that is to be planted on the farm and are made by the Oregon State college seed testing laboratory at Corvallis. Anyone wishing such tests should submit about a quarter pound sample to the laboratory indicating that it is seed to be planted on the sender's farm.

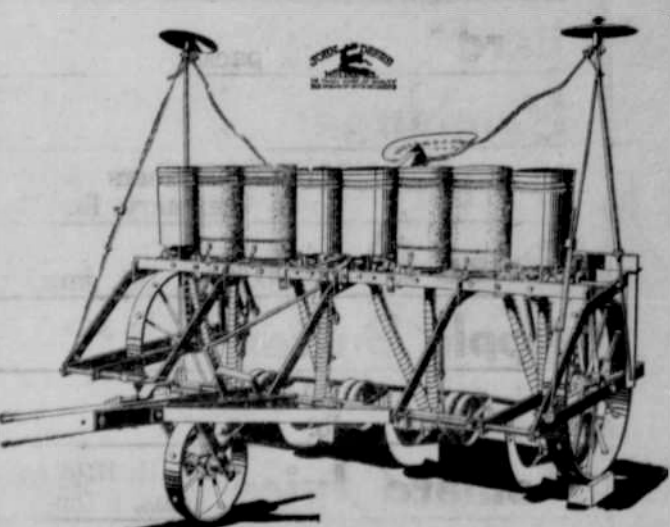
