Journal Recipes

ALL lovers of oysters—and their name is legion—like to celebrate the opening of the oyster season with a good old fashioned oyster stew. But meal planners are sometimes hard put to it to know just what to serve with an oyster stew. The next time you're in that predicament plan to have Jellied Southern Cole Slaw. It's the best possible balance to the main dish, and will complete the meal perfectly.

Jellied Southern Cole Slaw
1 package lemon-flavored gelatin; 1 cup hot water; ½ cup canned pineapple juice; 2 tablespoons vinegar; ¼ teaspoon salt; 2½ cups finely shredded cabbage; ½ cup cream, whipped; 1 tablespoon diced pimiento.
Dissolve gelatin in hot water, add pineapple juice, 1 tablespoon vinegar, and ½ teaspoon salt. Chill. Season cabbage with remaining 1 tablespoon vinegar and ¼ teaspoon salt. When gelatin is slightly thickened, place in bowl of cracked ice or ice water and whip with rotary egg beater until fluffy and thick like whipped cream. Fold in whipped cream, cabbage, and pimiento. Turn into mold. Chill until firm. Unmold or crisp lettuce. Garnish with mayonnaise. Serves 6.

Your Garden

What kind of borders shall we have? Flowers or shrubs—perhaps a combination, as flowers seem to hold up their heads and fairly shout to the world of their beauty when they have shrubbery for a background.

Oh, yes! there are fences. Did you ever notice what a difference a fence makes in some gardens? Especially when there are acres of cultivated land out beyond the house, a near fence softened by vines or shrubs, often provides something that "makes" that flower border.

Backed by a white trellis fence and a few yews for accent points we have an ideal background for a perennial garden—one which will be colorful throughout the summer.

First, tulips planted near the outer edge will bring early bloom before the other flowers are ready. After the petals have fallen the bulbs should be lifted and moved to another section of the garden when they are to ripen off. The continual watering of tulip bulbs when they are dormant is not good for them and will often cause decay.

Cup-and-saucer bellflowers (campanula) in pink, blue, and white, for the early season are followed by phlox in the various pink shades. Clumps of blue delphinium will contribute their bit for a lovely background.

In another corner of the garden Shirley foxgloves waving their salmon spires above blue and white cup-and-saucers are followed by lavender phlox.

With a pink rambler rose over the gate and a central pool planned as a garden mirror you will have a garden of which you may well be proud.

Perennials mean less care, and therefore, more time for repose. In these days of fast living and fast thinking, this is sure to strike a satisfying note.

To have a plentiful supply of perennial plants for your borders this fall or early next spring calls for intelligent planning. The chief expenditure is one of effort and care, rather than of money.

Select a protected, well-drained spot in a corner of the garden that is exposed to sunshine most of the day. The area will depend upon the number of varieties you intend to grow. It is not necessary to enrich this area much although the physical quality or texture of the soil is highly important. Adding some humus material such as completely rotted manure, compost, or commercial humus, will improve the quality of light soil, open up that which is too heavy, and prevent baking or crusting, which is most detrimental to tiny seedlings.

Make your rows run north and south, regardless of the bed's dimensions. After the soil is thoroughly prepared, use a pencil or lath to make the rows. Very few seeds need be planted deeper than two and a half time their breadth; the fine ones should be sown on top of the soil and lightly pressed in. Pure sand may be used to cover the seed. It is easy to work, and has the added advantage of automatically marking the rows, so that seeds slow to germinate can have the benefit of weeding and cultivation.

Sow the seed thinly and make the rows at least six inches apart; this will save at least one transplanting. Once a supply of husky plants is on hand, there arrives the problem of overcrowding. I prefer moving them to the garden where they may be grown much like vegetables until their removal, in the fall, to the beds where they are to bloom the next year.

Your flower garden or flower border will have that exquisite charm you have longed for, if a generous assortment of bulb flowers and perennials are used in the planting. A continuous display of color and beauty will be your reward. It is flowers, flowers everywhere that gives southern California its fame as the beauty spot of America, but flower lovers can by a little effort transport this beauty to their own home if they wish.

Journal Recipes

AMONG the culinary masterpieces of the South is beaten biscuit and this is a good time of year for those of us who aren't Southern housewives to have a little neighborly borrowing of this recipe. For beaten biscuit is the perfect accompaniment to a cool green bowl of salad. Follow the directions carefully and your beaten biscuit will have that real Southern touch.

Tennessee Beaten Biscuit

4 cups sifted cake flour, 2 teaspoons salt, 2 teaspoons sugar, ¼ cup cold shortening, ½ cup cold sweet milk, ½ cup ice water.
Sift flour once, measure, add salt and sugar, and sift together three times. Cut in shortening. Combine milk and water, and add to flour mixture, a small amount at a time, mixing until dough cleans sides of bowl. Run dough through food chopper twice. Toss on slightly floured board, shape into sheet about 12x3 inches, and beat with rolling pin until smooth. Fold over and beat again 3 minutes. Roll dough in square sheet. Cut in strips, 1x3 inches, prick deeply with fork every ¼ inch. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 25 minutes, or until delicate brown, then decrease heat to slow oven (275° F.), open oven door, and bake 1 hour longer. Makes 2 dozen biscuits.
