The days of Woodrow Wilson and his pipe dream about a League of Nations are over, and it would behoove a lot of our amateur statesmen to forget about being the "Saviour of World Democracy" and tend to our own national knitting, which seems to be tied into a Gordian Knot.

DICTATORS

DICTATORS, whether in international or domestic affairs seem to tread along a given path.

Their first step is to pounce on some popular theme within their own government, such as the labor problem, get the laboring class pitted against employer, and when the employing class is completely demoralized the next step seems to be that of "controlling" finances, then the law making or governing bodies of the country, even the educators are brought into line by the painting of utopian pictures. When these classes are sufficiently mesmerized into thinking that the saviour of the country is personified in the ambitious one—then is when the dictatorship is born. The whole thing is brought on so gradually, by such plausible argument that it is hard for the "supporters" to realize that the "reforms" have fallen on their necks like a millstone.

In international affairs, the dictators work along the same groove. Just last week saw the national entity of Czechoslovakia crushed by Hitler. The Sudeten grab, indirectly sponsored by every other democracy in the world, was to be the end of Hitler's territorial ambitions. It was through Hitler's promises that the rest of the world was lulled into a false sense of security from war. It was an easy matter for him to create "lawlessness" and much easier to use this as an excuse for the complete annihilation of Czechoslovakia. After this latest accomplishment of Hitler, the world is again alarmed as to the next step to be taken by this blight on the humanity of the world.
