A STUDY OF HISTORY MIGHT HELP

ANSGAR Johnson, in the Idaho Statesman, seems to be all in a dither on the question as to what the proper name of Succor Creek. In fact he intimates that the name should be changed to Sucker.

Some of the oldtimers around Nyssa could give Mr. Johnson an earful as to how the creek first got its name of "Sucker". One story that seems to be quite well substantiated is that coming from friends of a deceased pioneer of this county, Mrs. Mitchell who arrived in the Succor creek canyon in a party that was attacked by Indians. During this attack one of the party fell into the hands of the attackers, the rest of the party going on and finally finding refuge in an isolated farm compound. If that isn't enough to give real reason for calling the creek Succor then we are willing to give it back to the Indians.

The Statesman adds insult to injury when it sets up the Idaho Encyclopedia as unimpeachable testimony that the proper name for the disputed creek is "Sucker" this even in face of the fact that the United States Geological Survey gives it the name of Succor. And the Geological Survey dates back a lot farther than the Statesman's authority!

We'll string along with the old timers and Charlie Hackney in the indignation at a pusillanimous attempt to upset not only history but tradition as well.
