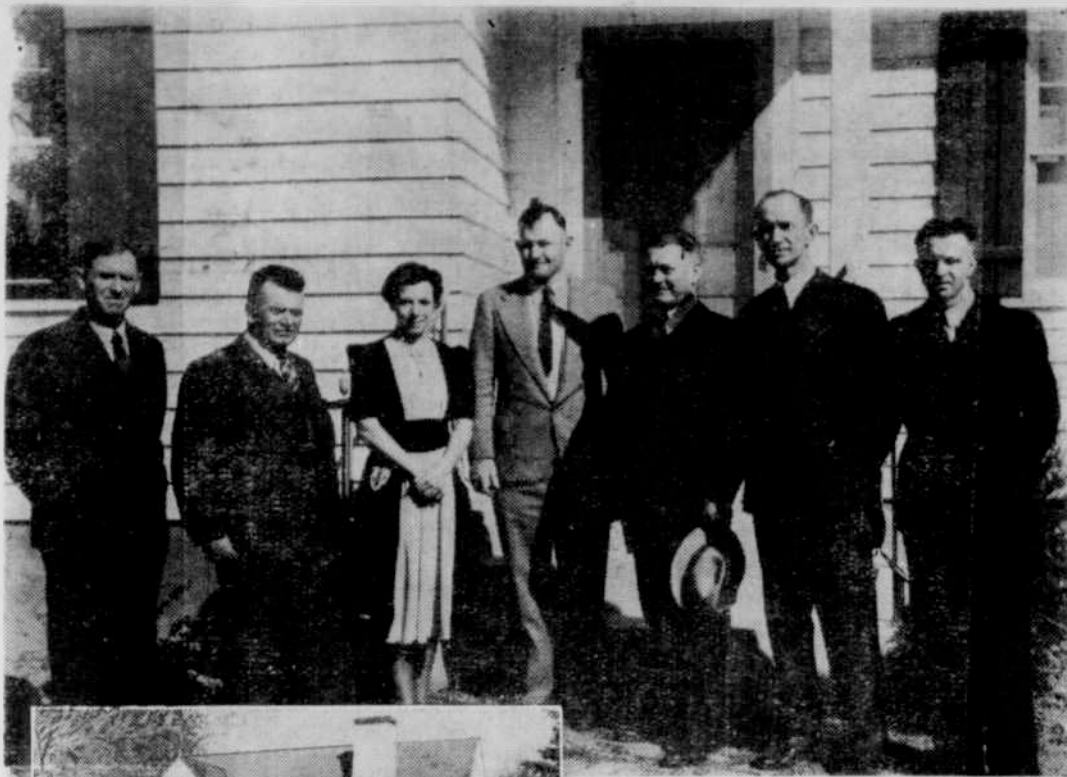
W. T. Hamilton who is working in Homedale spent Sunday with home folks.
