FISHING SEASON OPENS JUNE 15

The North fork of Malheur river and its tributaries upstream from the mouth of the Little Malheur will not be open for fishing until June 15, but will remain open until October 15, both dates inclusive.

But that part of the north fork of the Malheur and its tributaries from the headwaters of Beulah reservoir to the mouth of Little Malheur river are closed to all fishing. The Owyhee river from Snively Gulch to the Owyhee dam is also closed.

AUTO INSPECTION BILL IS VETOED BY GOVERNOR

ENFORCEMENT AUTHORITY OF ACT IS MISPLACED

SALEM — Oregon motorists will not be required to submit their cars and trucks to a periodical inspection after all. Governor Sprague has vetoed the bill establishing this additional regulation.

His reasons for disapproving the measure were two-fold. In the first place, he said, the motorists of Oregon are not yet ready to submit willingly to compulsory inspection of their cars. A campaign of education should precede any attempt to enforce such a requirement. In the second place, authority for enforcement of the act was misplaced in the highway department.

In the governor's opinion law enforcement functions should be entrusted to the police department. The highway department should confine its efforts to highway construction and maintenance.

The vetoed bill would have required every motorist in the state to submit his car or truck for inspection at least once and not more than twice a year at a cost of 50 cents per inspection. Offered as a traffic safety measure it was designed to rid the highways of "wrecks" and "jalopies" that operate with defective brakes and headlights to the menace of other highway users.

STATE FAIR GROUND TO HAVE NEW BARN

SALEM — Three new livestock barns to house exhibits in the junior division are now under construction at the state fair grounds, according to Leo Spitzbart, manager of the fair. It is also planned to install 600 addition seats in the stadium before next fair time, Spitzbart said.

SPEAKERS AVAILABLE FOR COMMENCEMENT

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene—High schools in any part of Oregon will have available as commencement speakers this spring, 24 of the leading faculty members of the University of Oregon, it was announced here by Dr. Donald M. Erb, president. All of those named in a list recently made public are experienced speakers and are authorities in various fields.

High school principals who wish to obtain a speaker from the university should write to W. G. Beattie, director of social welfare, general extension division, on the university campus at Eugene.
