## COW HOLLOW

By The Happy Farmer

Cow Hollow's water troubles are winding up fast. We have a driller drilling wells in the Hollow now and he says he wants to make it possible for every farmer in the Hollow to have a well. Goodness knows every farmer wants one.

Dale Limbaugh was the first one he drilled for. It was a fine hole. All the way down in blue clay about 180 feet to fine water and the clay formation does not even have to be cased. Very fine for the well but Dale is not able to buy a pump so he must continue to haul water 3 miles for his stock and a dandy useless well right in his yard.

The driller next went to the Art Eastman place where he got the same fine water at about the same depth. This time the drilling was all the way through coarse gravel. He had more on less trouble with the gravel caving in on him while drilling. Now that the well is drilled Art measured it again and became alarmed at the way the walls were caving in and went to Boise to try and get some casing.

The drill is now setting at the Chet Sage place. Again the ground formation is different. This time it is all yellow clay. Chet is well pleased with that and says he hopes it will be yellow clay all the way down. He says there is more alkali in blue clay than in yellow, so he thinks his prospect is good for good water.

The driller has already had two little runs of hrd luck in Chet's well, one time his cable broke and dopped the slush bucket and a few feet of cable in the well. Next time there was a loose rock hanging in the side of the wall of the well. He could see it by reflecting the sun light down into the well. He knocked the rock loose into the well and it proved larger than he expected and would not fall to the bottom of the well so he then had to drive it down before he could drill any more. The last we heard he was down 250 feet and still no water.

George Gabriel has been having pump engine trouble.

The water is in the canal now and we are sure anxious to get it into the ditches. Tuesday night there was still no water in the lateral that waters most of Cow Hollow.

Last Thursday Wayne Limbaugh while coming home from the siphon with a load of water and driving a colt, lost control of his team and they ran off. They ran almost a mile before he stopped them. There was no damage done only

Wayne lost part of the water.

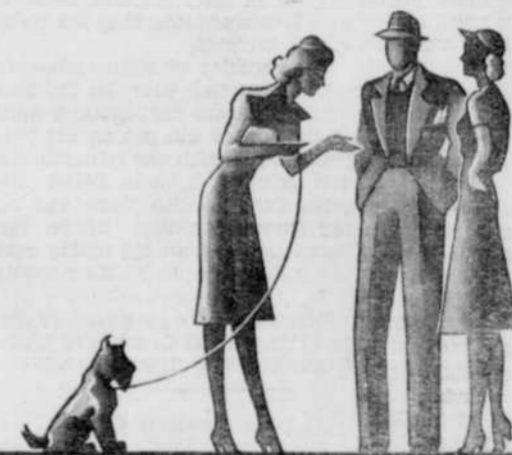
