Your Garden

One of the most helpful aids to the amateur gardener is a note book in which notations may be made. Someone has said, "Memory is the thing you forget with," and so it seems when one tries to recall the changes you had in mind last season.

Work is facilitated, if at the beginning of each new season one makes a system of notes, either lengthy or brief, upon any subject pertaining to flower culture. A particularly lovely color combination may have been discovered in some park or private plot. A sketch or detailed description may be recorded and it is then ready for use when it is needed.

Perhaps some unusually helpful suggestions have been found in magazines devoted to gardening, these may be clipped and pasted in the note book where they are always readily available. If left in the magazine, that number is often either mislaid or destroyed.

Very beautiful effects found in large, formal gardens often may be duplicated on a small scale in the pocket handkerchief estate, without loss of artistic effects.

Another thing of value to the smaller grower is to note failures, either with seeds, bulbs, shrubs or plants and the probable reason for such disappointments. These mistakes may then be more easily avoided the next time, especially when reliable information on the subject has been obtained.

It is well to make a diagram of last season's garden and keep it for study and reference. Some of the jarring color notes may be eliminated and a more judicious combination arranged.

By a careful and thorough planning, a succession of flowers may be had for the entire season, beginning in the early spring when the first flowers peep above the ground and continuing as long as the most courageous blossom dares to appear in the late fall.

This work of planning has been done by consulting seed catalogues and gardening magazines during those long days or winter evenings when there is more leisure. The results of this study have been jotted in your note book and are ready for use as soon as early spring planting is advisable.

It is not a bad idea to make notes of troublesome plant pests and the corrective measures for such. By having this knowledge at first hand time is saved and often plants may be rescued from destruction.

Systematic, intelligent planning is the surest way of obtaining satisfactory results. It is not only time-saver, but needless expenditures and disappointing results are thereby often avoided.

Try a garden note book for one season and avoid the confusion and disappointments of other years, the palest of ink is better than the best memory!
