Another pioneer dies. All of Cow Hollow bows their heads at the passing of A. P. Limbaugh, father of Mrs. Idellia Heaton and Dale and Wayne Limbaugh. Although Mr. Limbaugh's home was near Emmett he was known and well liked by everyone in Cow Hollow.

In 1937 Mr. Limbaugh came over and purchased 80 acres, one of the only two deeded farms in Cow Hollow and gave 40 acres each to his daughter, Mrs. Earl Heaton and his son Dale. In the summer of 1937 he and his wife spent most of the summer over here helping to clean the land and get it into crop. They both sure had the blood of pioneers in their veins. Mr. Limbaugh was the very picture of health, he didn't show he ever had a sick day in his life. They were seen in Cow Hollow quite frequently.

Saturday evening at 6 o'clock his heart just stopped like as tho you had turned off a switch. No warning at all. Funeral services were held at Emmett Friday. All his children were present.
