Your Garden

The rock garden is one of the most fascinating phases of gardening and it is not surprising that it satisfies the needs of even conservative persons who are looking for something new and different.

Novelty, however, is not a sufficient reason for its being in your garden. In only one way can rock gardening in this country ever become a permanent part of landscaping instead of a fad and a passing fancy. It must be established along sane lines by being made an actual part of the design of each individual home grounds. No two home grounds are any more alike than the characters and tastes of the individuals who occupy the homes. Therefore, no rock gardens should ever be the exact copy of some friend's or neighbor's.

Before starting a rock garden ask yourself two questions—"when it is completed will it be a pleasing addition to my garden? Will it really belong to the house and the grounds, like the trees, shrubs, and flower borders; or will it stand out and after a while become like the proverbial sore thumb?" Unless the background of the plants fits into the home garden picture, much of their individuality is lost.

Most authorities agree that a rock garden should look natural. How often one sees miniature mountains, bluffs and ranges of hills built on level ground in a vain attempt to imitate nature. Occasionally one sees a pool, with a heap of dirt beside it dotted with a few rocks and rockery plants. If there is a place in your garden where there is quite a slope that can be taken advantage of, a pool and rock garden together can be a thing of beauty, but so often they leave the appearance of Fido having dug for a rabbit in rocky ground.

The various kinds of walls usually make the simplest and least difficult forms of rock gardens. The terrace slope is a rock treatment of a sloping bank, instead of its being left as a grassy area or open to the effects of erosion. The stepped wall or terrace ledge may, in the first place have been the same kind of sloping bank as that of the terrace slope. The free-standing wall, although it borders more on the formal and the artificial than any of the other kinds, with careful handling may also become a delightfully fitting rock garden. The complete rock garden must not be a thing apart; it must help to bring unity into the entire garden.

The kind of rock to be selected for any type of rock garden will often depend to a large extent on the kinds that are to be found in the vicinity. Care must be taken to have them in harmony with the architecture of the house, the tradition of its style and to spirit of the home grounds.

Quarried or angular field stones often may be appropriately used to hold artificial banks. Stones with weathered faces are usually more attractive than those with newly cut or broken faces. Where there is a gentle slope, a row of stones may be placed at the bottom, with spaces between them two or three times as wide as the stones; other stones may be placed behind these spaces with the bottoms as high as the tops of the front stones and back far enough to hold the soil at the desired slope. Where the bank is steep the space between the stones may be filled with soil and the next stone laid over this opening. If the stone has a relatively flat surface, it should be placed that water falling on it will drain back and not off.

The base of a tree as it overhangs a natural bank, may be the most individual spot on the grounds for a rock garden. Of course, the kinds of trees and rock plants selected will be those adapted to the peculiar conditions involved. An elm or a poplar, should seldom be selected on account of the broad and shallow root systems which will deprive nearby smaller plants of needed moisture. On the other hand, trees such as oak, birch, white pine, honeylocust and others that are often naturally associated with rocky formations may be entirely suitable.
