Your Garden

With the aid of proper implements, good seeds, fertile soil and plenty of hard but healthful and enjoyable work—that garden of yours should certainly be growing, without further ado!

Gardens are the distinguishing marks of the home owning gentry. A garden is part of a real home—an essential part. No fire-escape window-box can ever make an apartment into even a semblance of a homey cottage nestling amid flowers and shrubs and flanked by a green velvet lawn.

Much of the fun of gardening depends upon having the proper equipment with which to do the job properly. No one would think of trying to get any pleasure out of a set of tennis if he were playing with a broken racket or with one that is badly balanced. Even the most amateur of golf fiends have a suitable array of clubs for their leisurely games.

Yet many gardeners work with tools that are old, broken, rusty and certainly inadequate. (I hope friend husband reads this and fixes the lawn-mower!)

Invest in a set of good garden tools and see how much fun gardening can really be when not handicapped by the inefficiency of poor equipment. Incidentally, when you are finished with tools do not leave them out in the garden, exposed to the deterioration of weathering and rusting. Have a shelter place for them. Wooden handles should be painted occasionally and the various parts oiled. We have a six foot length of 3 inch galvanized pipe, plugged at one end and half filled with linseed oil. Into this we put the handles of hoes, rakes, etc., and leave them a couple of days. This treatment keeps the tools in excellent condition besides making them pleasant to sight and touch.

There are clever and attractive little wire or metal guards that can be placed around the flower beds or around the less enthusiastic patches of lawn, in order to keep the neighborhood dogs and children from running over them.

For every gardening chore there is a proper tool. Look over your gardening equipment and examine each piece fairly critically. For the success of your garden, and your pleasure in working in it, will depend quite considerably on the efficiency of your equipment.

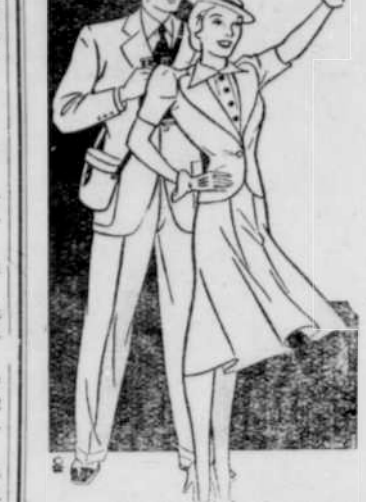

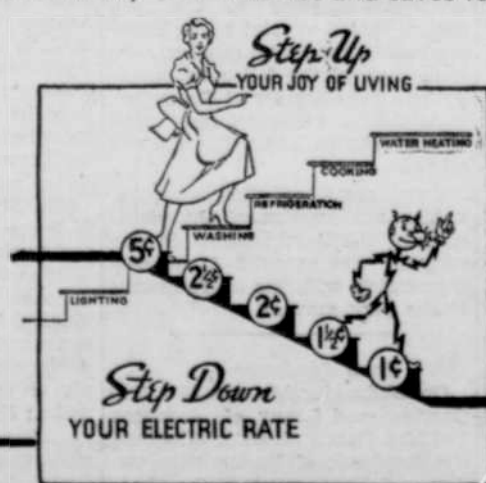
