ENLISTMENTS OPEN IN MARINE CORPS

The United States marine corps offers opportunity for enlistment for a large number of young men from the Pacific northwest during the months of June and July, according to Postmaster S. D. Goshert.

The enlistment term is four years. Applicants must be U. S. citizens, between the ages of 18 and 25 years, with no dependents. They must be of good habits and character and be able to furnish character references. Minors must be able to obtain their parent's consent. Opportunities for service are in Marine corps aviation; Marine guards for battleships, heavy cruisers, and airplane carriers of the U. S. fleet; foreign shore station and the various posts and stations throughout the United States. All men enlisted must undergo their recruit training at the Marine base in San Diego, before becoming eligible for transfer.

Applicants may obtain desired information from their local postmasters or by writing direct to the Recruiting office, 208 U. S. court house, Portland, Ore.
