Your Garden

Roses! Roses everywhere! That's what I exclaimed last week when I visited the Municipal rose garden in Caldwell. Truly, it was a sight to behold. Such gorgeous colorings! Most every kind of a rose one could wish for ranging from the dainty polyantha to the large single climbers.

Nothing in the whole range of floriculture is so charming as a rose garden in rose time. With so many varieties tried and proven in our own area I'm sure we could compete with any other rose city if we but tried. I've never grown roses, but then and there, I made up my mind to have a rose garden—no matter how small it might be.

Here are some instructions given me which I will pass along.

1. Select varieties suitable for your climate. (The lovely tree roses grown on the coast will not do well here because of the long drooping causes winter kill.)
2. Do not depend on catalogue descriptions but rather purchase from a reliable dealer.
3. Two year old, field-grown, budded stock is best.
4. Plant the bushes as soon as possible after they arrive.
5. Cut all canes to within three or four eyes of their point of origin on the crown.
6. In the fall after the wood has been hardened by several severe frosts, the bushes should be hilled up—some use soil, other, straw and then cover with burlap.
7. In the spring as soon as all danger of frost has passed and some of the canes begin to show a live green, the bushes should be uncovered.

The preparation of the bed, so they told me, was a very important point, as roses are generally expected to stay in one spot rather long. A generous dressing of well rotted cowbarn fertilizer, some coarse bone meal, leafmold and wood ashes should be well worked into the bed. If the soil does not have good drainage a trench should be dug and coarse gravel placed in the bottom and then filled with the fertilizer soil.

In setting the rose bush any bits of broken roots should be carefully cut off with a sharp knife. Dig a big wide hole in the prepared bed spread the roots gently and cover with a little soil, lifting the bush slightly so as to settle the soil about the roots. Then the rest of the soil is shoveled in and firmed down. If the bush is grafted or budded, the point of union should be about two inches below the surface of the soil.

Roses should be planted approximately 18 inches apart both ways.

If you are undecided what roses you want, I advise you to visit this garden. All the plants are labeled and you can see just what certain ones will do under our own climatic condition. Look to the foliage—choose the kind that won't mildew. If you want buds you will see the ones that are loveliest at that stage—if you like the wide open blossoms you will find lovely ones at that stage too.
