NEW WAYS TO ASSESS LAND

FARMERS and rural landowners of Jerome county may be interested in a new plan for the assessment of rural land, which has been adopted by the county assessor of San Diego Cal.

Using a classification based on a soil survey made by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the land is graded as to depth of soil and suitability to agriculture, ranging from eighty dollars an acre for the best land to eighty cents an acre for rocky, non-tillable mountain land.

The National Association of Assessing Officers points out that from these base values the assessed value is determined by additional factors, such as water supply, climatic conditions and location in regards to highways, community centers and transportation facilities. A citizen's committee checks the rating factors.

This plan, it seems to us, is a great advance over the hit and miss methods that are generally used in making land assessments. Nearly everybody knows that there is discrimination even if the proper officials do their best to make the tax burden equitable.—North Side News.

EVERYBODY PAYS TAXES

TWENTY-FIVE per cent of the people of this nation are under the blissful but entirely erroneous impression that they pay no taxes.

The blunt fact is that everybody pays a lot more than they think.

The Twentieth Century fund, a non-profit, non-partisan research organization, has shown this to be true in graphic studies of all types of American families from the farmer who has an income of \$500 a year on up to the man who has a million-dollar income.

Using the state of Illinois as an illustration, the Twentieth Century fund, upon careful research, found that an Illinois farmer with a \$500 annual income pays between \$56 and \$84 a year in taxes.

An Illinois farmer with an income of \$1000 a year pays his government between \$183 and \$207 a year in taxes.

An Illinois wage earner who earns \$1000 a year pays his government between \$147 and \$190 a year.

An Illinois wage earner with a \$2000 a year income pays between \$279 and \$359 a year in taxes.

Impossible, you say?

Indeed it is not only possible but entirely true not only for the people of Illinois but in every state. For, no matter what you do—whether you rent a house, go to the movies, have a drink, smoke a cigarette, buy a loaf of bread, get a new dress, take a trip in your car, buy a roast for dinner or treat your best girl to a soda—you pay a tax of some kind. Everybody pays taxes.—Reprint from Idaho Free Press.

THE WPA "STRIKERS"

THERE is both tragedy and comedy to be found in the various "strikes" of WPA workers which followed Congress' passage of a bill providing that these relief beneficiaries should work full time for their money, rather than a day or two a week.

In general, the strikers demand "higher wages," inasmuch as working hours were to be increased. And this shows the amazing attitude of a segment of relief workers toward their jobs. They have come to regard relief as a permanent profession—not as a temporary and unfortunate necessity. They believe the taxpayers owe them a life-long living, whether or not they produce
