

Around the Dairy Barn

CALF TIME SANITATION

Most troubles dairymen have with young calves are due to germ infections or incorrect methods feeding milk. Absolute cleanliness and thorough disinfecting are essential if losses from disease are to be prevented.

Follow this sanitation program recommended by the Purina Experimental farm and you will reduce your losses to a minimum.

1. PREPARATION OF CALVING STALL

Before bringing in the cow, remove all old straw or bedding and burn. Remove all traces of organic matter. Sweep ceiling and walls thoroughly. Then spray the entire stall, walls and all thoroughly with a disinfectant solution (Purina Creso-Fec-1 pint to 4 gallons of water). When dry, put in new fresh bedding. Stall should be warm, free from drafts and dampness.

2. PREPARATION OF COW

Just before calving time, sponge off the cow with a good disinfecting solution including washing the feet. Clean the udder carefully with a chlorine solution, be careful to use the proper amount of powder—read the directions on the package. The switch of the tail should be likewise washed. Then transfer the cow immediately to the calving stall.

3. CALVING TIME

Tie up the navel cord as quickly as possible after birth. Wash thoroughly around navel with a strong chlorine solution. Make a double tie in the cord as close to the body as possible. Then paint the navel cord with iodine. Navel trouble is almost always the result of negligence at birth.

Remove afterbirth promptly. Wash the hind quarters of the cow with chlorine solution. Wash daily until discharge ceases. Keep people away from the stall because infections might be carried in. Have a

STOCK AND GRAIN MARKETS

(Editor's Note: The following market information is supplied from material obtained over the Government leased market wire in the office of the extension economist at Oregon State College. The material is in the form of a weekly summary of trends in the livestock market and is not intended to replace spot day by day market reports.)

Hog Markets

Price declines at other markets and a narrow local demand prompted a general 40 to 50 cent decline at North Portland, despite a decrease of 500 in receipts. The closing top was around \$7.50. Receipts at eastern markets contained a high proportion of packing sows with the trade continuing to discriminate against all heavy offerings.

Cattle Markets

With cattle receipts at North Portland totaling 2600 head, 450 more than the previous week, the market was easy with prices declining. A few dry lot cattle were among the offerings but most of the run were grassers, quite a portion of which were well finished fairly heavy steers. The dry lot steers sold at \$8.50 to \$9.75 while grass steers weighing over 1050 lbs. were \$7.75 to \$8.25. Stocker steers were in fairly good demand at steady prices.

Lamb Markets

With offerings of only 1845 sheep and lambs at north Portland a decrease of 2150 from the previous week, prices were able to recover somewhat. By the close of trading July 22, slaughter ewes were practically back to the recent high time and the better grades of lambs selling at \$7. The lower grades failed to make as good recovery.

Direct and contract buying of sheep and lambs in the west for future delivery has been very slow. The bulk of the Montana contracts calling for September and October delivery have been on a basis of \$7 to \$7.25 straight with some mixed black face lambs up to \$7.50. Hot drying weather was deteriorating ranges.

Wool Market

The Boston wool market was more active and prices showed a very firm and rising tendency with the general level a few cents higher than a year ago.

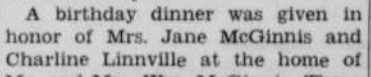
