JUST SUPPOSING!

At a time when mass production is under fire and the machine is being blamed for our woes, with some politicians actually proposing taxation for machinery to be applied to relief of those "displaced," it is interesting to look anew at the automobile industry, major exponent of the mass production methods.

According to the Automobile Manufacturers association, ten times as many persons are provided a livelihood by the activities generated by the automobile as find employment in the motor plants themselves. The A. M. A. estimate is that 6,380,000 persons live by the manufacture, that 6,380,000 persons live by the manufacture, service, distribution and other activities which automobiles set into motion.

Remove the machine-produced automobile, put it back on a custom-built or hand-made basis, and the reason for the great mass of service, road construction, petroleum output and other vast sources of jobs disappears. Nor is that all. The A. M. A. did not attempt to compute the effect on vacation employment, highway restaurants and the like, only a small fraction of which would be served by other transport if the automobile were returned to luxury class.

A silly hypothesis, to be sure. We have no intention of giving up automobiles by making them too costly to have democratic use. But for automobile substitute any other industry dependent to large degree on mass methods of production. Examine the train of employment generated by an of these. A NEW SUGAR ACT NEEDED

WORD recently received by sugar beet growers of this state that no bonus payment could be made on 1938 sugar on July 15 as originally hoped, calls to our attention a serious situation so far as the Oregon beet sugar industry is concerned. The sugar beet contract, under which the 1938 crop was sold to the processors by the growers, provides for a cash payment at the time of delivery of the beets to the factory, and a subsequent payment for beets on July 15 if the net return on sugar sold justifies such payment. The initial payment made to growers last fall was \$4.40 per ton and no additional payments will be due in any of the factory districts until the net returns from the sale of sugar exceed \$3.35 per hundred pound bag. During the period October 1, 1938, to June 30, 1939, the net return on sugar sold was below \$3.35 per bag. The next return is arrived at by taking the gross wholesale price at which the sugar is sold, less freight and selling expenses.

In addition to the \$4.40 which the beet grower has already received for his 1938 beets, he has also received approximately \$1.80 as a benefit payment out of the excise taxes paid by the processors into the government fund for this purpose, if he complied with the terms of the Federal Sugar Act.

The beet grower as well as the processor possibly stands to lose additional revenue for two simple reasons, either of which could be eliminated. First, if all of our home produced sugar were consumed in near-by markets the net returns from the sale of sugar would be higher and the price paid to the grower for his beets would be increased. Secondly, the Secretary of Agriculture is empowered, under the present Sugar Act, to regulate the supply and demand and thereby maintain reasonable price levels in or-

An unfriendly administration in Washington seems to think, however, that the grower is already receiving enough for his beets and judging from its attitude in the past, the Administration's policy will probably be to depress prices further until the beet grower stops growing beets.

Since the present Sugar Act expires in 1940, it is highly important that new legislation be enacted in the next session of congress to insure to our sugar beet growers, and the American beet sugar industry in general, an adequate price for this non-surplus agricultural commodity and an opportunity for the normal expansion of this important American industry.
