New Electric Flatirons Ease Work and Cost of Laundering



Clothes last longer with a modern light-weight automatic electric iron.

BECAUSE of its low initial and operating cost, the labor and time saved, and the excellent satisfaction obtained, the electric flatiron is the most popular and common household tool on the electrified farm of today.

In fact, it is used in more than 90 per cent of the homes where electricity—whether from the high line or from individual power plants—is available. It, therefore, may be wondered why anything should be said about an appliance which is so widely used and so generally regarded as an indispensable part of the modern house.

But it must be remembered that thousands of families each year receive electricity for the first time. Also, that countless electric irons now in use are 8, 12 and even 18 years old, although they—like other devices—constantly are being improved in design, durability and efficiency.

The housewife who has an old-model electric iron which apparently still is giving excellent service may wonder if she should purchase a new one. The answer is as obvious as to the question, "Would you rather drive a new car or one that is 10 years old?" But, when buying a new iron, she should be informed regarding the value of the extra features and the performance that she may expect from it.

In addition to improvements in shape (sharp points and bevel edges), the new irons also have more comfortable handles, generally are lighter in weight and usually have safety rests—all of which contribute much to easier and more rapid work. Then too, nearly all now are equipped with adjustable thermostats which automatically maintain the temperature at the point best suited to the fabric being ironed. Using an iron incorporating all of the foregoing features, the housewife can do a much more satisfactory job in about one-third to one-half the time required with the old sardine.

Durable, dependable and efficient electric irons of the automatic type range in price from \$5 to \$9, with the average approximating the lower figure. The current required naturally varies with the size of the family, its mode of living and the types of fabrics ironed. Countless tests, however, show that the average power consumption amounts to but one kw.-hr. per month per person—five cents or less at present household rates.
