SALEM—Oregon will be free of bonded indebtedness in 1960, providing no new issues are made, it was announced this week by the state treasurer's office. The present bonded debt is \$38,718,085, of which \$19,675,000 is for veterans' state aid bonds which will be retired in 1951. State highway bonds totaling \$16,841,750 will be wiped out in 1960. The state also owes \$2,120,335 on Oregon district interest obligations and \$81,000 on Oregon farm credit bonds.

Former Governor Honored

Ex-Governor Charles H. Martin was honored this week by a group of friends who presented the state with a plaque bearing his likeness and the inscription, "Charles H. Martin, Citizen, Soldier, Member of Congress and Governor of Oregon." The plaque was hung in the basement of the new capitol, a location which promptly drew the fire of admirers of the former governor. The Salem Capitol Journal expressed editorially the view that the plaque should be placed in a more conspicuous spot. The opposition returned with the statement that the basement had been intended for use as an art gallery, but the Martin admirers pointed out that at present the plaque would hang by itself and until the time when enough art objects have been presented to make the basement a real art gallery the Martin plaque should be placed where all could see it.

To Survey Oregon Schools

Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction, announced that the Works Progress Administration had approved of a grant of \$45,444 from federal funds to carry out a survey of school building adequacy in the state of Oregon. The survey will give employment to nearly 50 workers who will study the existing schools and determine the types best adapted to Oregon needs. Results of the survey will be made available to local and county school officials.

Bank Job Turned Down

A. A. Schramm, prominently mentioned as a possible successor to Mark Skinner as state superintendent of banks, narrowed down the field of candidates by announcing that he was not interested in the job. Schramm, who once held the post, said this week that he was content with his private business in Corvallis. Fred S. Lamport of Salem is now the leading candidate for the job, providing Skinner is replaced by a republican.

Professional Cards

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Six Counties Late

Only six counties had failed to send the state tax commission summaries of assessments this week as the time drew near for determining ratios of assessed to true valuations. When completed the summaries will show how much each county must pay to the state this year, and also what portion of total value of each utility is taxable in each county. The tardy counties are: Baker, Deschutes, Josephine, Klamath, Lincoln and Marion.

Liquor Profits Go To Poor

Liquor profits amounting to \$39,427 were distributed to the counties and cities of the state by Secretary of State Earl Snell this week. The sum represented their share of the profits for the third quarter of the current year. The bulk of the profits are given to the state public welfare commission to be used for relief purposes.

Auto License Drawings

Secretary of State Earl Snell announced that drawings for the first 100 of Oregon's blue and white 1940 license plates will be held at the state capitol on Nov. 22. Distribution of next year's plates will begin the same day, although motorists will not be permitted to use them until Dec. 15. The first consignment of the new plates arrived at Salem this week.
