the passing of a resolution to investigate the possibilities of forming a co-operative seed cleaning association and Martin Osborne, Ben Maltzberger and Klaas Stam were chosen as a committee to make the preliminary investigation. Since a few years ago seed growers in this area received a dollar less than Idaho growers for the same seed, as at that time eastern Oregon was rated with western Oregon, whose product was rated inferior and now western Oregon, for some unknown reason, receives a dollar and sixty cents more, the Grange feels that it is time to establish eastern Oregon as a separate producing unit and through co-operative marketing establish a rate commensurate with other communities.

After the first investigations have been finished, the Grange expects to call an open meeting of all farmers and seed growers in this area and to hold a round table discussion of the whole subject.
