A PAYING INVESTMENT

TO those citizens, who worked so industriously for the formation of the new Nyssa Union High School District, must come a sense of satisfaction, when a perusal is made of the things accomplished already.

A few of these accomplishments that come to mind include, a much higher morale among students with a resultant discipline that can be traced directly to a modern school with modern equipment and staffed by a faculty that is large enough to keep student activities at such a level as to keep the young people busy. As to the morale, have you noticed the turnout at the athletic events?

Numbered among these increased activities are such classes as journalism, Smith-Hughes, home economics and a school band, to name but a few.

In the journalism class, the first printed school paper for Nyssa, "The Bulldog" this year made its appearance. And through this school newspaper, we may expect the student body this year to have its first printed annual.

And our home economics department has, on more than one occasion, demonstrated its ability to prepare dinners for large numbers, and to serve them properly. And in this department, as in the Smith-Hughes, we may look forward to housewives that know what a balanced meal is with the result that, (may we hope for so much?) malnutrition through ignorance will not be known in our district.

And who among us oldsters could have gone to the carnival last Saturday night and not come away from it without a mental note of praise for the well-decorated hall, the diversity of games and entertainment?

One could go on at great length about our high school and its activities—but it can be summed up in a few words—we as taxpayers have a right to be mighty proud of the initiative that prompted the formation of the district, which resulted in our new high school with its varied and educational activities offered our future citizens, who are making the best of every opportunity.

Yes, our new high school is a paying investment—not perhaps in dollars and cents—but in satisfaction of a job well done.

to a section which provides a small revenue in comparison to the amount expended. With few users on many miles of transmission lines the return on the investment must be small but this is an item which the utility overlooks in order that proper service may be provided to all.

Some years ago the government created the Rural Electrification Administration with the idea of providing electrical service to at least fifty per cent of the homes in the United States by the year 1950. As an indication of the sincere desire on the part of the Idaho Power Company, this utility was able to boast that fifty per cent of the farms in their territory were being served in the year 1934—just sixteen years ahead of the plans of the Rural Electrification Administration. Today, however, the company is serving 14,000 farm homes or seventy-six per cent, while the national average is only twenty-two per cent. And in this connection it may be mentioned that the users of the power in the rural areas are receiving service at the same rate as those users in the towns and cities, where short transmission lines bring heavy revenues.

For the twelve months ending with September, 1939, the Idaho Power Company was serving 14,000 farm customers, using 1,856 kilowatt hours of service per year at a cost of \$50.48 per customer annually, or 2.7c per hour.

To bring electric energy to city, town and farm requires 3,802 miles of distribution lines, equivalent to a single line from Boise to New York and thence south to Tampa, Florida, and west to Vicksburg, Miss. In addition it requires almost 1300 miles of high voltage transmission lines, which would make a single line from Boise to Fort Worth, Texas.

With this information all must agree that the Idaho Power Company is doing a good job in furnishing electrical service to the rural areas as well as the citizens and towns of southern Idaho and eastern Oregon.—Independent-Enterprise, Payette, Idaho.

NOTICE HEREBY IS GIVEN, That sealed bids will be received by the District School Board of District No. 26, Malheur County, Oregon, by B. B. Lienkaemper, Clerk of said District at Nyssa, Oregon, until 8:00 o'clock P. M. on the 8th day of December, 1939, for the purchase of an issue of funding bonds of said School District No. 26, Malheur County, Oregon, in the amount of \$36,000.00.

Said bonds will be negotiable coupon bonds; will be registrable as to principal only at the option of the holder; will each be designated "Funding Bonds" and will be dated as of January 1, 1940, and will be in denominations of \$1000.00 each; will be numbered consecutively from 1 to 36, both numbers inclusive; will mature serially in numerical order in the amount of \$5000.00 on the 1st day of January in each of the years 1941 to 1946, both years inclusive, and in the amount of \$6000.00 on the 1st day of January, 1947; will bear interest at a rate not to exceed four per cent (4%) per annum, payable semi-annually on the 1st day of July and the 1st day of January of each year until maturity; will be payable both as to principal and interest in lawful money of the United States of America at the office of the County Treasurer of Malheur County, at Vale, Oregon; and will be callable after January 1, 1941.

Said bonds are issued by virtue of a majority vote of the legal voters of said School District No. 26, Malheur County, Oregon, voting at an election duly called and held on November 18, 1939, and by virtue of a resolution of the District School Board of said School District No. 26, duly passed and adopted on the 21st day of November, 1939, and pursuant to the Constitution and laws of the State of Oregon, including Chapter XXX, Title 35, of the Oregon Code 1930, and laws amendatory thereof and supplemental thereto, and Sec. 58-2308, Oregon Code 1935 Supplement as amended, and Ch. 505, Oregon Laws, 1939.
