GOOD AND FAITHFUL SERVANT

LAST week the United States and the world
for that matter, was shocked to learn of
the death of Senator Borah of Idaho.

Of particular sorrow it must be to those who
still believe in constitutional government, for
the venerable Senator was one of the staunch-
est supporters of government by constitutional
methods—not by subterfuge.

Senator Borah was not a man to play to the
crowds, rather it was his method to be the guid-
ing light in a movement. He ran contrary to most
men in public life—he never sponsored a move-
ment for the mere sake of publicity, leaving that
to those that needed, or felt they needed, to
climb on the band wagon of popular themes.

The farmers of the United States have lost a
champion for their cause, and the time will per-
haps never come again when they will have a
man in Washington who lent his experience
and weight in securing legislation that would
benefit the farmer.

Paul Mallon, in one of his columns this week,
paid fine tribute to the "Lion of Idaho" and in
closing said, "The public too will suffer in an-
other respect—in its news. More news of inter-
est and value to the people came from Borah in
the last 20 years than from any other statesman
outside the White House."

BECAUSE IT'S POPULAR?

CONGRESSMAN Pierce, according to news
dispatches, has written to the Oregon
Commonwealth Federation in Portland in which
he says (in response to a resolution from the
federation protesting the continuance of the
Dies Committee) "that the federal finances are
in a very serious condition" and "under the cir-
cumstances it would appear to be only reason-
able to ask that the work of this committee be
turned over to a regular federal agency equip-
ped and financed for the purpose of maintain-
ing just such investigations."

You will note that the congressman does not
actually commit himself to such a proposition
—he merely calls attention to it. All of which
sounds like pre-election campaign stuff.

In the first place why has not this agency done
what the Dies committee has done in unearthing
subversive slime in not only the low places but
the higher ones too (and perhaps it is getting in
the sanctum sanctorum). Chairman Dies is him-
self a Democrat, as are most of the committee
—so there can be no charge of political animus.
The Dies committee has done yeoman service
to those who believe in the government of the
United States and are working to ferret out
those individuals and organizations who by
"boring from within" seek to supplant our form
of government with that of some form of foreign
ism.

Why should any person, who truly believes in
our form of government want the Dies commit-
tee transferred to an agency that in the past has
failed to bring to light any of these activities?
For it is strange to relate that this "regular fed-
eral agency" did not come to life until after the
Dies committee was brought into existence.

And of still further significance is the fact
that the House this week voted 345 to 21 in fa-
vor of continuing the Dies committee—we won-
der how the congressman voted?

This economy howl is good campaign stuff,
but the paltry fifty to two hundred thousand
dollars that the committee will ask for is not
even a spray of dew compared with the money
that is wasted in a lot of other cock-eyed
schemes that have been hatched in Washington.
