NYSSA DROPS ONE TO BAKER; WINS OVER PLYMOUTH

It was Bulldog against Bulldog last Saturday night when Baker high met Nyssa high and both teams fought just as hard and tenaciously as their chosen nicknames indicate. When the parade of baskets was over and the final score was tabulated, it was found that the Baker squad had counted for six more field goals than the local team, to win, 44-32.

Baker showed all the flash and drive that advance notices claimed for them, displaying a dashing, high polished fast-breaking offensive that kept the home team's defense working at top speed.

The Nyssa Blue and Whites pressed the favorites all during the contest, however, and it was not until the fourth quarter that the invaders piled up a lead that could be considered safe. Matching the visitors basket for basket in the first half and crowding the Baker quint closely on defense, the Nyssa squad kept within range to wind up only four points behind at the half, 19-15.

Both teams showed uncanny shooting ability in the game, looping howitzers and hook shots in from all over the court. Under the basket superior height on the part of the Baker Bulldogs told against the home team, for huge center Spence, used his six feet four inches to full advantage and took complete charge of rebounds from the backboard, ably aided by teammate Williamson.

It was a hot night for Ken Lewis, veteran Nyssa guard, who swished in six out of the nine shots that he took during the game. In addition he added one free throw to make a total of 13 points for the evening. He tied for high point honors with Holman, Baker guard, who made five field goals and three free throws.

Lanky Frank Wilson, center, led the Nyssa high Bulldogs to a 31-18 victory over New Plymouth last Friday night when the local basketball quintet invaded the Idaho town.

The game was even until the second quarter when the Blue and White of Nyssa began to pull away to emerge with a 17 to 13 lead at half-time.

During the second half, the Bulldogs tallied fourteen counters while holding the New Plymouth squad to five meager points. Wilson led the scoring with fourteen points and Scott, New Plymouth, topped his team with eight.

The second half of the game showed a much improved defense on the part of Nyssa high, which has been a weakness of the team so far this season.
