--- HAPPY FARMER WRITES OF SHEEP



The above is a view of the Deseret Sheep sheds, southwest of Nyssa. It is estimated that the Deseret will lamb about 4300 sheep this year.

While the sheep industry has fallen off in the county during the past few years, it is still a major industry.

After a day or so the pen of sheep are moved on to a larger pen and around 25 mothers with singles or 15 with twins are put into it.

In a very few days mother knows her baby by sight, voice and scent and baby knows mother's voice. They now are ready to be put into a small band again.

If you love to watch innocence, youth and vigor, just sit for a few minutes and watch these lambs play. A lamb looks clumsy but he will run with almost the speed of a horse and 'twill give your heart joy to watch his jump and caper around.

When baby is hungry he lets out a call for mamma. Mother hears this call among thousands and answers back.

On a quiet, clear day you can hear this calling back and forth for nearly a mile away and it is a continuous roar almost like a huge waterfall. Yet mother recognizes baby's voice and baby mother's and goes straight as an arrow across the band past hundreds to mother. In case of twins one might come from the north and the other east but they both arrive about the same time.

All the hospital work is done in the sheds. Often a mother for some reason has no milk or a mother dies. The lamb then is a "bum." A mother of twins that has a spoiled teat the second lamb is a bum. In case of triplets the third lamb is a bum. The bum lambs must be adopted by a ewe who has lost her lamb. If the number of those ewes are not available, then some mother must take a second one and call them twins.

Getting a ewe to take a bum is no little job. Usually the dead lamb is skinned and the hide stretched over the bum. The ewe is then tied, head and foot, to the side of one of those little pens so she will have to let the bum suck. After 12 to 24 hours of this she is freed and if she lets him suck fine. If not she is tied up some more.

Feeding and watering through all this process is no little job either. In most all sheds the sheep in those 4 ft. pens are watered by hand out of a bucket. The ones in the other pens are watered out of troughs.

The Deseret people with around 4300 ewes feed eight tons of hay per day. About half of this hay is chopped hay. Many of the sheep men feed shelled corn to the drop band and oats to the ewes with small lambs. Oats being more of a milk-producing grain.

The lambs are taught to eat grain when they and their mothers are put into the large mixing lots. Oats are put into panel pens around over the lot. The panels are raised off the ground for the lambs to get under but their mothers can't.

Moving a band of sheep with small lambs is a very difficult task.

dogs can handle a band of sheep on the range as good as a half dozen men can.

The sheepman's next important helper is the pack horse or mule. The sheep herder's home is a 10x10 tent. His household furnishings consist of a tin box-stove that will weigh about 10 lbs., a few pots and pans and a few syrup buckets, tin plates, tin cups, water bags, a grub box and a bedroll. His home and furnishings must be moved every few days for six months out of the year.

His camp tender with his pack string of from two to six pack horses moves camp, supplies the needed water, packs in the groceries and tends camp in general. He is always well supplied with groceries, tobacco and ammunition and receives about a half more than the ordinary farm hand or cowboy, but what a life.
