Meeting To Be Held For Small Seed Growers

The problems of the small seed grower will be discussed at a series of meetings to be held throughout the county beginning Monday, February 26, according to an announcement from the county agent's office. The meeting at Nyssa will be held at the Nyssa High School on Monday, February 26, 8:00 p. m. These meetings will be devoted entirely to consideration of the production and marketing problems of those seeds being grown now and to new kinds which have possibilities in Malheur county.

One of this series of meetings will be especially for growers or prospective growers of Ladina clover. This meeting will be held at the Boulevard Grange Hall on Wednesday afternoon, February 28. The entire meeting will be given over to a discussion of production, certification, reeling and marketing of Ladina clover seed.

E. R. Jackman, extension specialist in farm crops, will be present at each of these meetings to assist with discussion.

Trout Season Opens April 13

The opening day for the general trout season in Oregon was set for April 13 by the state game commission when it met last week to establish the 1940 angling regulations. The closing date is October 15.

The general bag limit for lakes and streams will be 15 pounds and 1 fish but not to exceed 15 fish in any one day, or 30 pounds and 1 fish but not to exceed 30 fish in any seven consecutive days or in possession at any one time.

A complete tabulation of the open and closed waters will be issued by the game commission in printed form within the next few weeks, but following is a partial list of changes affecting local waters:

Baker County: Anthony Lake and that part of Burnt river between Unity dam and Herford, closed to angling. Unity reservoir will be open from September 20 to June 30 with a bag limit of 10 pounds and 1 fish or not more than 10 fish in any one day.

Grant County: Magoun lake, East fork of Canyon creek, that portion of John Day river south of forest boundary, and that portion of North Fork Malheur river north of Poplar creek, closed to angling.

Malheur County: South Fork of Willow creek, closed to angling.
