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ORDINANCE NO. 262
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 239 PASSED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NYSSA ON THE OTHER DAY OF APRIL, 1938, BEING AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE PARKING OF MOTOR VEHICLES ON CERTAIN STREETS WITHIN THE CITY OF NYSSA, AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY."

THE PEOPLE OF NYSSA ORDAIN:

That Ordinance No. 239 passed by the Common Council of the City of Nyssa on the 15th day of April, 1938, being an Ordinance entitled "AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE PARKING OF MOTOR VEHICLES ON CERTAIN STREETS WITHIN THE CITY OF NYSSA, AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY," is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for the owner or operator of a motor vehicle to park any motor vehicle upon that portion of Main Street lying between the Oregon Shortline Railroad Tracks and Fourth Street, between the hours of Nine O'clock A. M. and Six O'clock P. M. for a longer period than two hours.

Section 2. Any owner, operator or driver of a motor vehicle who shall violate the provisions of Section 1 of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof in the Recorder's Court shall be fined not less than One Dollar nor more than Ten Dollars.

Section 3. It is hereby made the duty of the City Marshal or other police officer of the City of Nyssa to see that
