High Spots on Record-Breaking Run



Signs of the times in a motor age—these highway markers tell the story of a two-year, 100,000-mile truck test run recently completed by Chevrolet. In Canada, Mexico and every state of the Union, the truck operated on all types of highways and under every conceivable weather hazard, setting a new world mark for sustained and certified automotive operation, under the sanction and official observation of the American Automobile Association. The unit carried a 4,590-pound "payload." An average of 15.1 miles per gallon of fuel was maintained throughout the 100,000 miles, at an average operating speed of 33.07 miles per hour. Oil mileage was correspondingly high—1,072 miles per quart.

**ELECTRIFICATION
OF RURAL AREAS**

Electricity will be available before July 1 to 98 new rural users near Harper, Oregon, and Homedale, Idaho, according to Bernard Frost, Idaho Power company local manager.

Thirty-four of the farms are located in the Harper section of the Vale project, and for these extensions it will be necessary to build 15.7 miles of electric lines. When the new construction is completed, 65 per cent of the farms adjacent to Harper will be using electricity, Frost estimated.

Construction of 27.3 miles of line to serve 64 farms will be completed in the Big Bend area and on the new Owyhee project lands north and west of Homedale within 60 days. Most of these farms are in Malheur county.

During the past 15 months Idaho Power company has built 88 miles of rural electric lines in Malheur county to serve approximately 350 farm families. This figure does not include nearly 60 miles of line which are now under construction and contracted within the county. Twenty carloads of poles and 3 cars of

wire have been used in the past 12 months in the construction work.

M. and 8 o'clock P. M. of said day, for the purpose of submitting and there will be submitted, to the legal voters of the City of Nyssa, the question:

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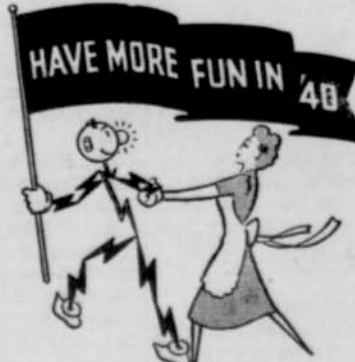
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
