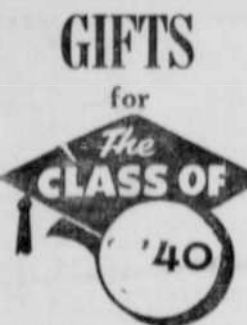

defense have barely scratched the surface. There is already for adoption by congress a plan for financing a war if we get into one. It is on the principle of the income tax, but so arranged that everyone, no matter how small his income, will have to pay something.

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was last year when it was found east of Spokane and in Idaho.

There is a shortage of men for wildlife restoration projects. Eight states are asking aid in locating technicians for this work. There are plenty of applicants for the jobs, but the requirements are rigid. Thus far 125 trained wildlife experts are supervising 196 projects (four in Washington, three in Oregon). It is a new field of endeavor. The government pays 75 per cent and the states 25 per cent of the cost of the projects. Washington projects are acquisition of 18,000 acres of winter range for deer in Okanogan county; acquisition of winter range for elk in Yakima county; acquisition of Squaw creek antelope range in Kittitas county and development of Squaw creek area. Oregon projects consist of transplanting beaver to suitable habitats; restoration of sage grouse in southeastern Oregon; re-seeding the burned over area in Tillamook, Yamhill and Washington counties.

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
