SALEM—Governor Charles A. Sprague will leave Thursday for a visit to the middle west that will take him away from the state for at least two weeks. The Oregon executive will address the conference of governors at Duluth, Minn., June 2, on relief problems. On June 4, he will deliver the commencement address at his alma mater at Monmouth, Ill., and on June 5, he will deliver an address at Springfield, Ill. During his absence Ernest Fatland, speaker of the House of Representatives, is officiating as governor.

State in the Book Business
The State Board of Control found themselves in the book business in a big way this week. The last legislature appropriated \$3000 toward the financing of an "Oregon Guide", a WPA book describing the state's historical background and its scenic attractions. In return for this investment the state gets 1600 copies of the book which it is now offering for sale to schools and libraries at \$1.75 a copy.

First On Election Returns
Sherman, Hood River and Clackamas counties, in the order named, were the first three counties to file their complete official election returns with the state department following the recent primary election. The county returns are being checked and tabulated as fast as they are received at the state house.

Expect Big Tourist Travel
Harold B. Say, director of the highway department's travel bureau, predicts a big influx of tourists from California into Oregon this summer. He bases his prediction upon a recent tour of that state. Many Californians who remained at home to attend the fair on Treasure Island last year will visit the Pacific northwest this year, Say declared.

Truck Law Would Reduce Revenue
Adoption of the proposed amendments sponsored by the Oregon Association of Truckers would result in a loss of some \$570,000 a year in revenues from taxes and fees paid by truck and bus operators, according to engineers of the Public Utilities commission. Sponsors of the measure claim that it would save \$200,000 a year in administrative costs.

Traffic Accidents Decline
Oregon's traffic accident record continues to improve, according to figures compiled by Secretary of State Snell. This too, in spite of the fact the situation in the city of Portland grows steadily worse, with traffic fatalities in that area 60 per cent greater during the first four months of the current year than they were in the same period last year.

A No-Pay Job is Hard to Fill
Apparently Governor Sprague is experiencing some difficulty in filling the vacancy on the Oregon Hydro Electric Commission caused by the death recently of John M. Hodgins of La Grande. The position which carries with it a lot of responsibility, provides no remuneration for time spent on the job, other than actual expenses for travel, meals and hotel room and few men who are qualified to fill the position are willing to make the sacrifice of time and effort required.

Oregon Farmers Pinched by War
Oregon agriculture is already

feeling the bad effects of the war in Europe, according to J. D. Mickle, director of the state department of agriculture. With domestic markets already overstocked with fruits, canned goods and grains, the war has now shut off the foreign markets for these products Mickle declared in advising Oregon farmers to prepare for further reductions in prices for the products of field and orchards.
