New Bus Schedule For Coast Points

Motor coach service to all Pacific coast points was improved by Mt. Hood Stages on May 25, by a change in schedule that eliminated the former over-night stop in Bend, and thereby shortened the travel time between central Idaho, eastern Oregon and west coast points by many hours. New 25-passenger coaches have been placed in service on the line which runs from Boise, and Ontario to Vale, Burns and Bend over the newly completed Central Oregon highway. Connections are made in Bend with buses to Eugene, Corvallis, Salem, Portland, Seattle, Klamath Falls, Medford and San Francisco.

The new schedule has been set to leave Boise at 11:00 at night and will pass through Nyssa at 12:35 a. m., arriving in Bend at 6:50 in the morning, and Portland at 1:10 in the afternoon. The schedule from Portland, Eugene, Klamath Falls and Bend will arrive in Nyssa at 5:05 a. m. and depart immediately for Boise, connecting there with Union Pacific Stages to Salt Lake City and east.

Stop-over privileges are allowed at any point along the route it was stated by Leonard Bolton, passenger representative for the company, who was in Nyssa this week conferring with Sid Smith, local agent for Mt. Hood Stages, at the Owyhee Drug company.
